School Board Pays Tribute To Retired Chairman Dr. Yeo

The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held yesterday afternoon when the secretary read a letter from the clerk of the Executive Council stating that the Government had accepted the resignation of Dr. Ira J. Yeo as chairman of the Board as from 31st March, and that Dr. Gordon Lea had been appointed chairman until June 1963. On taking the chair Dr. Lea asked for the co-operation of all members of the Board and paid tribute to the work of Dr. Yeo over a long period of years. These words of tribute were joined in by several members who were present. Hon. Dr. MacMillan moved, seconded by Mr. MacPhee, the following resolution which was adopted: "Whereas the Charlottetown City School Board has learned with feelings of deep regret of the resignation of Dr. Ira J. Yeo as chairman of the Board, a position he has filled for thirteen years to the complete satisfaction of the Board, and whereas great progress and improvement has been made in our four Public Schools during Dr. Yeo's tenure of Office. "Be it resolved that the Charlottetown Board of School Trustees express its sincere feelings of appreciation for the good work accomplished by Dr. Yeo during his chairmanship of this Board for many years, and that this token of appreciation be spread in our minutes and given to the Press."

A new schedule of increased supplies for the teachers was approved and adopted. Due to the Teachers Federation meeting on the 19th to 21st inst. it was decided that the schools would not open until Friday morning, the 22nd inst after the Easter vacation. Several committees were asked to bring in reports for the next meeting of the Board.

Proud Owner Of Champion Holstein

An Ontario Junior Farmer, who had graduated from fourteen years' successful Calf Club activities, is today the proud owner of a six-year Holstein which has recently broken all world's records for production. In 365 days on a twice-a-day milking, Jack Wauchop's Lyndene Hartog Daisy, produced 1224 lbs. butterfat from 29,422 lbs. milk, the average test being 4.98 per cent butterfat. The record was made under the supervision of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. "Daisy" far exceeded the previous World Record on twice-a-day milking of 1139 lbs. butterfat made in 1947 by another Canadian Holstein, O.H.E. Abbecker Darkness owned by the Ontario Hospital, Hamilton, Ontario, boosting the record by 85 lbs. in fact no Holstein in the World has ever beaten her record even on three times-a-day milking. During her best day on test Daisy gave 111 lbs. (44 1/2 quarts). Jack purchased the mother of Daisy as a Calf Club calf for only \$25.00 back in 1940, the purchase being made from Archie Cameron, Woodbridge.

Shield Against Aggression

Truman said that in the pact "we hope to create a shield against aggression and the fear of aggression—a bulwark which will permit us to get on with the real business of government and society, the business of achieving a fuller and happier life for our citizens." Truman termed "absolutely untrue" the charge that the treaty is aggressive in intent, a charge which Russia made in formal notes on the eve of the signing. "The pact will be a positive, not negative, influence for peace, and its influence will be felt not only in the area it specifically covers, but throughout the world," he declared.

a blast at the Atlantic pact. Diplomats were certain Russia would attack the pact before the 58-member assembly. But there was much speculation about what form the thrust would take. Russia has not moved to place the pact on the assembly's agenda. Gromyko could, however, turn his guns on it during the debate on the Italian colonies—expected in itself to be one of the toughest problems. The assembly is scheduled to be opened at 4 p.m. AST by its president, Dr. Herbert V. Ewart, Australia's external affairs minister.

Skippers First Island Dragger

Skipping the first and only dragger registered in Prince Edward Island. "Land" Lace, 23-year-old hero of the "Marie Brenda" sea rescue near Isaac's Harbour Light, N.S., some two months ago, is busy with his crew fitting out the 40-ton "Winnie Ann" at the Marine Wharf.

The five Lunenburg seamen arrived in Charlottetown last Tuesday in the "Marie Brenda", including Gordon Lace, aged 18, the skipper and his brother; Gordon Acker, cook; and Jobe Fry, aged 26. James Sheaves completes the crew of the "Winnie Ann".

After reading the news-story of the loss of the "Marie Brenda", Mr. Sydney Bushoe, owner of the "Winnie Ann", wrote Capt. Lace offering him the dragger. Correspondence followed and, instead of coming over to see the ship first, skipper and crew surprised Mr. Burhoe last Tuesday and went to work. They chopped away the ice surrounding the schooner and hope to be ready by the end of the week to sail for Pictou for an overhaul.

Two of the crew served with the navy during the last war, James Sheaves being on loan to the Royal Navy. The other, Cook Acker, served all through the war on coming duty and the French coast on D-day without mishap. However, the "Marie Brenda" was his fifth shipwreck—none of which occurred as a result of enemy action.

Completed in Mahone Bay, N. S., in 1947, the "Winnie Ann" was engaged in dragging scallops for the Canadian markets during the last two seasons. Last September she dragged for ground fish off Cape Bear, P. E. I., gaining a fair catch of haddock.

The youthful skipper has dragged for three years off the Middle Ground, Western Banks, Sable Island and Banquereau, and is optimistic for this season's catch.
