20 DEAD IN N.Y. FLOODS

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ALBANY, N. Y., July 8.—Twenty dead, seven missing, many hundreds temporarily homeless and property damage estimated at several million dollars was the toll tonight of a week-end of violent rain storms in upstate New York. Four dams collapsed and scores of bridges and railroad lines were washed out. Gas and electric service was suspended in several municipalities, many hundreds were driven from their homes in lowlands. Buses and automobiles were marooned by the scores. Communications lines were widely affected. Swollen rivers and creeks were receding gradually in most sections, and the weather bureau said that occasional showers forecast for the next 12 hours should not increase the danger.

All except two of the deaths were caused by drowning. Homeless persons are being housed in the south central portion of upstate New York, where hardest hit. Mayor Leon F. Wheatley of Hornell, a city of 16,000, appealed to the state temporary relief administration for funds to provide food and clothing for persons forced from their homes. "Water mains are broken," the mayor wired. "Desperate sanitary conditions threatened. Wire immediate funds."

Practically every street and cellar in Hornell was flooded, and water, gas and electric light service was out of commission. Fifty children were rescued when the water threatened the Rotary summer camp.

—PIRATES GET CASH AND JEWELRY

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONG BEACH, Calif., July 8.—Black-hooded pirates, carrying chains and leg irons to fasten their victims, today raided the luxurious gambling barge, Monte Carlo, and escaped with loot estimated at \$32,000 in cash and jewelry.

Ed. Turner, owner of the barge, reported to officers that five men, wearing black silk stockings over their heads, swarmed aboard the boat during a dense fog and quickly chained 13 members of the crew.

The Monte Carlo is anchored about four miles off the coast and the raid occurred at 4 a. m. after patrons had been taken ashore in launches.

Monthly Meeting Of Summerside Town Council

The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held in the council chambers Monday, July 8th, Mayor Lidstone presiding. Paid bills amounting to \$8,428.74 were confirmed, leaving a bill of \$168.72 for gravel to be laid over for the next meeting. Unpaid bills amounting to \$1,205.19 were ordered paid. For the electric light department paid bills amounting to \$442.11 confirmed and unpaid bills amounting to \$840.84 ordered to be paid.

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A petition from a number of the residents of Eustane Street requesting that a permanent street be laid in concrete by local labor and foremen was read by the town clerk. Councillor McKay considered the communication was not legally drawn up as it was not witnessed and so could not be considered as a petition.

A resolution moved by Councillor Grady to pave Eustane Street as requested above was read by Mayor Lidstone but was not seconded. Councillor Nicholson again put a motion to amend the town bylaw, to allow a two thirds vote of the Council for the expenditure of money not provided for in annual estimates to stand. Mayor Lidstone refused to put the motion and claimed it was out of order. Councillor Nicholson again moved the paving of Eustane Street and other streets to complete the paving of the central section of the town, work to be done by the Warren Paving Co. Mayor Lidstone also refused to put the motion.

A resolution moved by Councillor McKay to form a bylaw requiring all restaurant owners to pay a license fee of \$10 and to abide by certain regulations contained in this bylaw was seconded by Councillor Bishop and adopted unanimously. W. W. Mutitt and R. E. Ellis were appointed auditors for the coming year. Councillor Bishop reported streets in good condition. The total fines collected for the month of June were \$110.00. S.

Trusted Secretary Sought For Alleged Theft

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ARCHAT, N.S., July 8.—Royal Canadian Mounted Police were scouring Cape Breton tonight for Francis I. Vane, wanted in Boston for the alleged theft of \$25,000 in bonds from his employer, John Shepard, Jr., a merchant.

Vane, Shepard's secretary, was believed to have headed for Nova Scotia by car, accompanied by his wife, and a report that they had been seen in West Arichat last week started police on their search.

On leaving West Arichat, the couple left for the prominent residence of R. C. M. P. Constable McDonald of St. Peter's was searching in the Margaree district tonight.

According to information received here, Vane had been the trusted house secretary of the prominent New England merchant for 10 years. Mrs. Vane, an attractive brunette, also had been employed in the Shepard household for a number of years. The pair disappeared from the Shepard summer estate at Lenox on June 13 and soon afterward the merchant reported \$25,000 worth of negotiable bonds missing, \$10,000 of which already had been converted into cash.

Leaders Ejected From Relief Camp

Men Escorted From Rockcliffe By R.C.M.P. Detachment — Strike Will Now Terminate Is Belief.

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, July 8.—While two detachments of Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the full strength of airmen at Ottawa air station stood by, leaders of the Rockcliffe relief camp workers' strike were tonight ejected from the camp. The Rockcliffe project is a part of the air station.

Virtual termination of the strike was expected as the leaders were loaded on a truck and brought to Ottawa, five miles from the camp. "The strike will probably not be continued," said a spokesman for the group said as they left the camp. In Ottawa the men were unwatched from the truck under the watchful eye of a single Mounted Policeman and one airman and dispersed quietly.

The Rockcliffe strike started this morning when 125 of the 508 men registered at the camp held a mass meeting and presented "demands" of \$1 per day wages, changes in the hospital staff and transfer of the camps from Department of National Defence to Department of Labor.

As the men assembled and the names of the leaders were read off, J. S. Downham, spokesman of the group said, "we have done this for you fellows, are you going to let them put us out?" He had been a leader of a strike at Long Branch, Ont., relief camp when the men walked into Toronto over a year ago, he said.

Germany Announces Details Of Naval Building Program

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BERLIN, July 8.—Germany's naval building program for 1935, including two battleships, two cruisers, 16 destroyers and 28 submarines, was officially announced tonight.

The following program was made public in a communique based on the naval agreement with Great Britain, some of the details of which have already been laid this year.

Extensive Damage Caused By Floods In Western Can.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WINNIPEG, July 8.—Western Canada, only just recovering from storms that took three lives in a week, tonight counted two more dead and extensive crop and property damage from week-end twisters, cloudbursts and hail.

As the truck to take them to Ottawa was loaded with their baggage the other relief camp men dispersed to their quarters.

The R. C. M. P. detachments moved away. The airmen returned to headquarters across the airfield to be mustered out, with the exception of the regular night watch.

The strike appeared to be over. In Ottawa the strike leaders stated that they had not yet formulated any plans. They would meet tonight or early tomorrow to discuss their ejection from the camp and make a statement.

NORTH BAY, Ont., July 8.—Predicting that within two weeks 3,000 unemployed from northern and western Ontario would arrive here en route to Ottawa, Robert Stewart, British Columbia hunger marcher, today urged unemployed here to form a contingent in the trek.

Stewart, who said he would remain here until the marchers arrived, announced he would try and establish an office here where unemployed wishing to join the march could be registered.
