Conservative Leader Reviews Vital Issues In Convincing Address

Reviews Party Platform and Exposes Insincerity of Liberal Party Apologists

Political issues were reviewed in a trenchant speech last night by Hon. Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, leader of the Progressive Conservative Party, in which both the Conservative and Liberal platforms were analyzed and the Liberal record of broken pledges and neglect of matters of vital interest to the Province was scathingly exposed.

"The recent provincial election in Ontario," Dr. MacMillan said, "was called on the order of Prime Minister King. The Liberal Provincial Premier, Mr. Nixon adopted the slogan—'Come what may, I stand behind Mackenzie King.' 'You all know what happened. The Liberal Party was almost wiped out—the most emphatic reversal and rebuke Mr. King has ever met. 'Something had to be done about it, so Premier Jones, as the Press announced, was compelled to break into the historic war conference at Quebec to get Mr. King's order to try Prince Edward Island next in order to see if the great damage done in Ontario could be counteracted.

"This is the real reason for our snap Provincial Election on the 16th of September next. This is the reason for all the hurry and confusion in the Province. It is only on our farmers at the busiest season of the year. This election could have been held in the Fall after potato digging, but the great haste is due to the fact that Mr. King can't stand the election will go down in Island history and be notorious for the fact that our Island soldiers are disfranchised and not given a chance to vote.

ment failed so terribly in their duty to our soldiers as may cite the bye-elections as an alibi and say the soldiers could not vote then.

"Premier Jones' record could be summed up by his acts of discrimination: (1) Against two portfolio members of the Government; (2) Against King's County, only members in the Executive Council, out of office; (3) Springing an election without the consent of the House and knowledge of the full executive; (4) Disfranchising over 11,000 soldier voters.

Jones Gov't. Platform

Dr. MacMillan then proceeded to analyze the platform of the Jones Government. He said:

"Economy will be practised." 1943 The Liberal platform of 1935 was: "L1—Reduction in expenditure of the Government; Budget annually." (Plan 2)—"Strict economy in administration and reduction in the number of officials."

The Record From 1935-1943

Instead of economy the most extravagant, wasteful government in the history of P.E.I. Of what value is the record? The debt increase of hundreds of thousands of dollars each year but one. Instead of reduction in number of officials, the number has doubled. The majority of members of the executive council were given new and unnecessary jobs with large salaries. The main idea of the administration was to look after themselves—they never knew what economy meant.

Plank One

The Result: Provincial Debt, August 15, 1935—\$4,887,846.73; Provincial debt, December 31, 1942—\$9,232,828.21. In less than six and one-half years—\$4,242,535.58; increased taxation and increased debt. The budget for the same period—\$4,250,000.00, without which our debt would now be 13 1-2 millions.

Plank 2—No Limit will be placed on expenses necessary to the care of tubercular people. This is the promise. What is the record? In 1940, the legislature voted \$70,000 for the care of T.B. people, and they could only spend \$3,641.00. In 1941, the Legislature voted \$100,000 for T.B. people, and they could only spend \$7,089.00. In two years they refuse to spend and withheld \$270,000 for those in dire need and who can adequately measure the effect of this injustice and neglect.

Plank 2

The Opposition urged them to increased Old Age Pensions at the last session of the Legislature and asked them to vote the money in the estimates—they would not do so.

Promise is one thing—Record shows what the promise is worth. This may be a case of history repeating itself—the Liberals as far back as 1927, promised Old Age Pensions for this Province. Several years after, they repeated the promise, and introduced a resolution which the legislature passed, but did they put it into effect? Oh, No—that was our job and we did it.

Plank 3

The pension lien has been a source of trouble and annoyance to pensioners and their families as well as to the Commission. It is imposed by virtue of a Statute passed by the Legislature.

What about the Sanatorium? Nothing about increased bed accommodation. What of the long waiting list of T. B. sufferers waiting to get a chance to live by getting into the San? No answer.

What about the wonderfully large and complete delegation representing all Prince Edward Island that waited upon the Government several weeks ago about increased bed accommodation at the San? No answer. Surely, such a large and representative delegation on a matter of such deadly importance is entitled to the courtesy of an answer.

Dr. Ross Miller of the Department of Pensions and National Health, when here some days ago, on a survey of the hospital situation in this Province, said he would go back to Ottawa and recommend that this Department either build a San here or an annex or addition to the Provincial San. This would greatly relieve the situation and is exactly what I have been trying for over three years to get our Department of Pensions and National Health Government to do. If this solution is now made, we know that two or three years of valued time has been lost and many lives of our T. B. sufferers have been sacrificed.

The announcement made yesterday that the Dominion Government has allotted \$75,000 for the Sanatorium coupled with regret that Hon. Ian MacKenzie was not here in person to make the announcement shows politics sticking out in every line.

This grant is just what I have been urging for 3 years. Why is it given now one week before the election—just one object—a bribe to our people? But, how, our people won't be fooled. This grant Government failed was not tak-
