THE GOVERNMENT AND PROHIBITION.

We print this morning in other columns an outline report of the proceedings in the Supreme Court Saturday in the case of Connolly, convicted of illegal selling of intoxicating liquors. The course taken by Attorney General Peters in this instance was so extraordinary and entirely unexpected as to call for comment. That he should have been unready to proceed is altogether unaccountable. Mr. Peters was in the House and took part in the discussion when the law was enacted. A year later when he was Attorney General the law came again under review in the House and was slightly amended before going into operation. Surely under these circumstances and knowing as he must have known that the first conviction would be contested, Mr. Peters should have been able and ready to defend the law for which his Government stands responsible.

It is to be regretted that Premier Farquharson is absent at the present time. We believe him to have been sincere in enacting the Prohibitory Law, and in his determination to have it enforced. We print in another column his interview with a Winnipeg paper, given while passing through that city on his way to the Pacific Coast. He expressed full confidence in the law. Were he here he might have inspired his Attorney General with like confidence and readiness.

The friends of the law need not however take too much to heart the unfavorable situation of the moment. The law is neither the better nor the worse for the doubts which any individual chooses to proclaim upon the housetop. In due time the Courts will decide upon the validity of the law. The stay of proceedings in the Connolly case need not and will not prevent other prosecutions and a vigorous enforcement of the law in the case of any who may violate its provisions. Every conviction obtained will be found to be so much ground gained when the highest tribunal in the Empire has pronounced the law to be valid, as we believe it will.

The visit of the Canadian Ministers to Great Britain has attracted a great deal of attention. The London Daily Mail and St. James Gazette has devoted a good deal of space to Canada since the Ministers went over. The Glasgow Herald published an extended and most complimentary review of the addresses of Hon. Sydney Fisher and Prof. Robertson, in the course of which it said:

Five years ago we took from Canada only 7 per cent. of our imported food; last year we took 15 per cent. and in the next five years the proportion will be probably doubled. In cheese alone we now derive 70 per cent. of our imports from Canada and Prof. Robertson says (though he did not name the quantities) that the butter trade has increased fifteen-fold and the bacon trade twenty-fold in 10 years. In 1890 Canada exported 162 shiploads of produce to Great Britain, and last year 480 shiploads. And perhaps the most important fact of all is that the exports of Canadian wheat were last year thirty times greater than they were ten years ago.

The Canadian Pacific steamship Empress of China recently broke the trans-Pacific record, making the distance between Yokohama and Vancouver, 4,800 miles, in 9 days, 18 hours. The best previous time was 10 days, 14 hours. We have become accustomed to speak of the Atlantic as a "ferry", it being now so quickly and regularly crossed by the great ocean liners. The enterprise of the Canadian Pacific Steamship Company is now making a ferry of the broader Pacific ocean.

Up in Manitobah they make the prisoners in jail turn out and work. Quite recently a European prisoner attempted to escape from the turnkey in charge, whereupon three other prisoners named Roberts, Cudney and Burton assisted to recapture him. The good service was reported to the Department of Justice at Ottawa and the three loyal prisoners at once received their liberty. One of them had only three days more to serve, another one month and the third seven months. They thus get liberty with honor.

The Marconi system of wireless telegraphy is now in regular daily use between the Hawaiian Islands. The most important towns of the group, Honolulu and Hilo are between two and three hundred miles apart, and a wide ocean barrier separates them. Wireless telegraph stations have been set up on the Islands of Oahu, Hawaii and some intervening islands and messages are exchanged without difficulty although there are some pretty long jumps between stations.

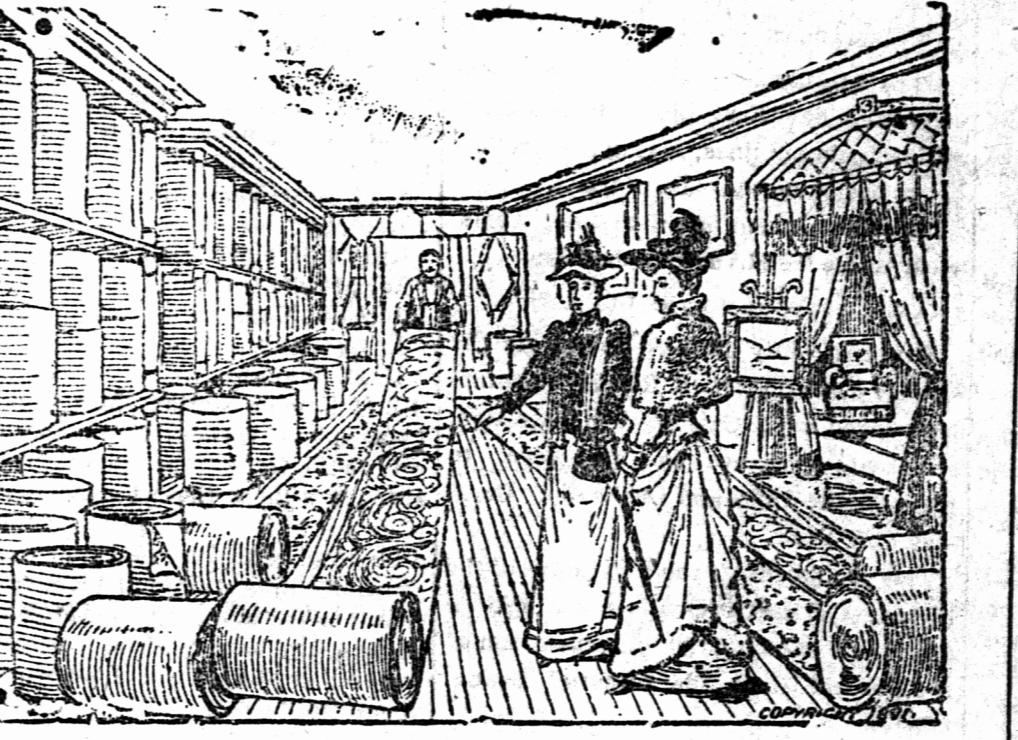

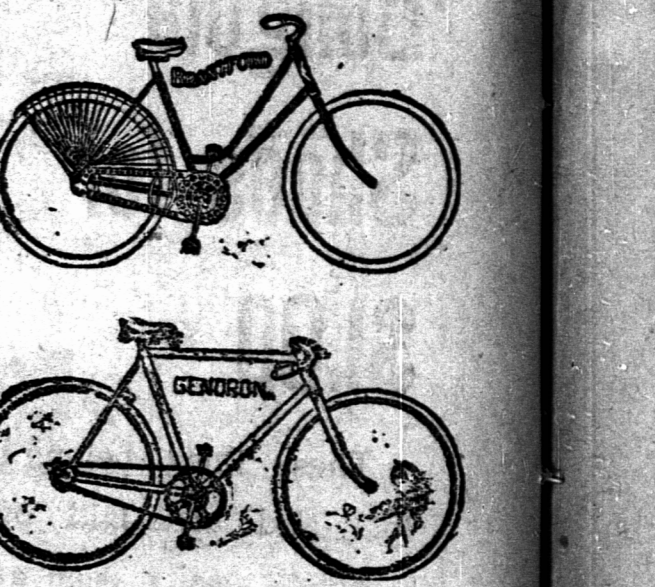
