MOTION PICTURE KODAK PRODUCED THAT CAN BE LOADED IN DAYLIGHT

Ease and Low Cost of Operation, Fireproof Projection Machine That Goes With It and Process of Reversing Image are Main Features of New Achievement.

ROCHESTER, Jan. 15.—What is termed the greatest achievement in photography since the invention of the roll film is announced here today. It is in the form of a motion picture kodak which Dr. E. C. Kenneth Mees, director of a research laboratory, states may in time supplant the present still picture cameras. "Every one their own director" is the slogan of the new camera and film. The camera is an all metal box which takes a film 16 mm. in width in comparison with the standard movie film width of 35 mm. This film is loaded in daylight exactly as the amateur rolls are loaded in kodaks. The lens is an F3.5, which focuses through a unique device. The shutter is of the cam type. The viewfinder is brilliant and one sees the image while cranking. There is a fireproof projection machine which comes with the camera.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. DUNCAN MACLEOD

On November 23rd one of Hartsville's oldest landmarks passed away in the person of Duncan MacLeod, born at Springton on February 6th, 1841. In the spring of the same year he with his parents moved to Hartsville and settled on the farm occupied by him at his death and from which he was absent for more than a week at a time Mr. MacLeod was always a hard working man, his father having died when he was quite young and his oldest brother having been killed in the American Civil war. He was left alone to till the farm and clear for himself, a farm and support his mother and young sister to whom he was always a loyal son and brother. Early in life he realized that life in this world even for those who enjoy it longest is only as the flight of the sparrow and that there was something beyond for which man must strive and he was always searching the scriptures for the hidden manna for which his soul always hungered and his search was not in vain, for he died a full assurance of a glorious resurrection. From his early manhood he was a member of the Presbyterian church at Hartsville. He was a man of strong convictions and a shining light in the community, always doing what he thought the Master would have him do, always visiting the sick or afflicted and comforting those in need. Beside being a true Christian, Mr. MacLeod was declared in 1914 he gladly shouldered the burden of the farm that his son might do his bit for King and Country which burden he bore for four and a half long years without a complaint. He leaves to mourn their loss of a kind and loving husband and father his wife, (nee Jessie MacLain) and the following sons and daughters: J. Angus, merchant tailor, Halifax, N. S.; Rev. Robert Alexander M. A. B. D.; Missionary to Batan, West China; Mrs. Wallace MacLeod, Brookline, Mass.; Mrs. James W. Loche, West Somerville, Mass.; Major, Allan and Annie at home; also one sister Mrs. John Corbett, Grayville. His funeral which was largely attended, took place on November 27th to Hartsville cemetery where all that was mortal of a true Christian was laid to rest beside those of his daughter who predeceased him sixteen years ago. The pall bearers were Messrs. M. A. MacLennan, John MacLennan, Alex. MacLennan, Neil Nicholson, Murdoch Stewart and Hammond Jewell.

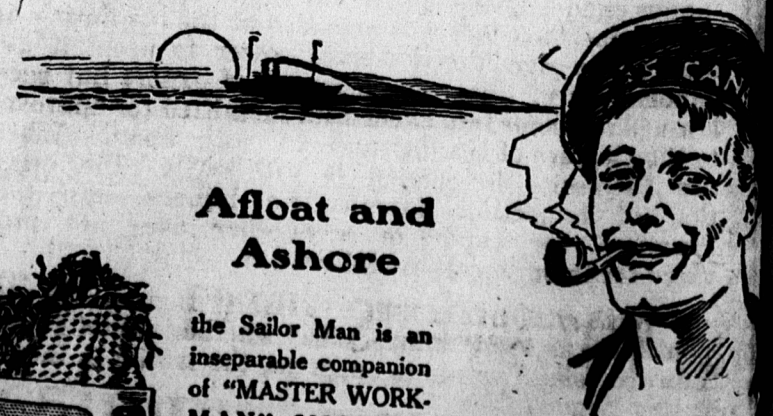
