A GREAT HERD OF HOLSTEINS

Francis M. Jones, of Chucky Corners, near Clinton, New York, owns a herd of about seventy cows. With cows at \$50 a head that means \$3,500 worth of bovine stock - a pleasant little nest for a farmer - but these cows are worth in the aggregate more than \$900,000. They are record-breaking Holsteins, chiefly the results of hard work and scientific breeding, for the original capital was but \$1,480. Two heifers at \$125 and a sire were the basis of the herd. The \$198,520 surplus has been created by the cattle born on the farm.

These strides have been taken within the last six years, and the story is a forceful example of what breeding of thoroughbred cattle will do. Jones had a knack for raising cattle and an eye for judging a good cow. He produced, in fact, the world's greatest milk machine - Spring Farm Pontiac Lass, with a record of \$44.15 pounds of butter in seven days. He sold that cow for \$10,000, but he still holds her sire and her dam and, as a result, all the cattle on the farm are close blood relations.

The evolution of the milk machine has been slow. There have been many old notions to dispel and many new ones to be discovered. Pontiac Lass has many things in her favor that the cows our fathers kept did not have. For instance, it has been learned that if she were milked but twice a day her production would diminish. At first it would be merely a case of suffering on her part, but at length she would be out of the record-breaking class altogether. During her tests she was milked four times daily. In fact all the cows in milk on the Jones farm are milked three times a day.

Then, too, the Spring Farm concrete tables have been standardized and some wise persons has applied the idea of variety to meals. It has long been known that variety in diet is essential to the health of the human animal, but cattle have kept right on getting grass and corn only or even bran and no grain. Cattle fed on such monotonous rations form part of the 5,000,000 which the Department of Agriculture says are confining the country more than they give and hence keeping the prices of foods in the sky.
