CONSUME 10,000,000 TONS OF COAL—During 1929 locomotives on Canadian railways consumed 8,628,711 tons of bituminous coal; 11,409 tons of anthracite coal; 63,796,548 gallons of petroleum, and 35,683 cords of wood. Converting the oil and wood to the equivalent quantities of coal according to thermal values, a total of 10,677,673 tons of coal is reached.

CANADIAN GAS UTILIZATION—The sales of manufactured gas in Canada during 1929 for domestic purposes totalled 17,638,942 thousand cubic feet; in addition the amount of natural gas consumed for similar purposes amounted approximately to 18,000,000 thousand cubic feet, while industrial concerns used 12,800,000 thousand cubic feet of natural gas.

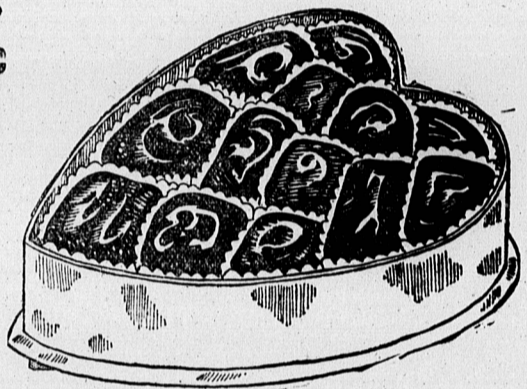
