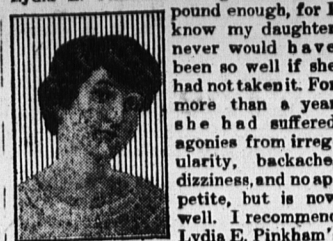
Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family on any date over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. DURY M.G. GENERAL PERCHING DELIGHTED WITH RECEPTION.

A British Port, June 8.—Major General Perching and his staff arrived here this morning after an uneventful trip. All the members of his party were in good health and spirits. Their ship was escorted into port by American destroyers.

A hearty welcome was extended to the Americans by official representatives of the Admiralty, the war office and the municipal authorities. The war office has assigned a Brigadier General of the British army as aide to General Perching. He took up his duties with the commander in chief, as soon as the latter reached here.

General Perching said to the Associated Press: "Speaking for myself and my staff we are glad to be the standard bearers of America in this great war for civilization. The opportunity of landing at a British port and the welcome we received are very significant and are deeply appreciated. We expect in the course of a very short time to be playing our part on the western front."

Though the war has been going on almost three years, and though our gallant Overseas contingents have won undying fame for Canada, most of us in the home have hardly yet waked up to the real nature of the struggle in which we are engaged, and the necessity that we too "do our bit" in whatever way lies open to us. It is just this detached attitude which has prevented Canada's whole weight being felt behind our divisions in France. From it the National Service Board hopes to arouse the nation, using straight from the shoulder advertising as a potent means to the desired end.

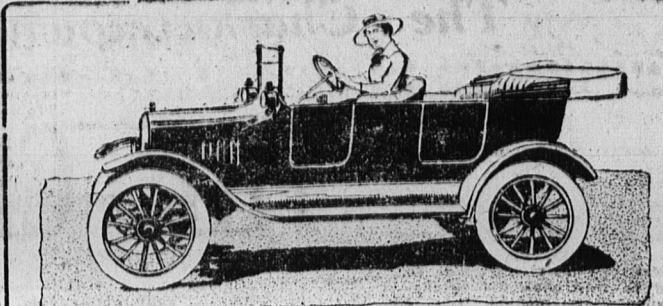
INJURED ISLAND SOLDIER WRITES

Mrs. Samuel Waddell, of this city, has received a letter from her son, Samuel Waddell, who left his home here fourteen years ago for the West and enlisted two years ago in Boyle's famous Yukon Contingent at present he is in hospital in Scotland suffering from an injury to his back received as the result of being thrown from his cycle. He says: 107647 S. G. Waddell Yukon, M. M. G. Battery Queens Park Ward Spangburn Hospital Glasgow Scotland.

Dear Mother—Just a few lines to let you know how and where I am. You will be surprised to see by the above address that I am in the Hospital. I landed here this morning, May 11th. I am not seriously injured. I had an accident on my cycle on the 6th in France and got my back hurt so they have shipped me across. They are sending a lot of wounded here. This is a fine place and the people use us fine. It was a fine trip from Dover up to Glasgow—600 miles run. I was awfully lucky to get off so easy and to be sent to Glasgow. We are in the heart of the city and a pretty one it is.

I suppose you saw by the paper the hot times the Canadians had on Vimy Ridge and in front of it. I was all through it and some hot times we had. We had a lot of casualties. I lost some of my best chums there. I had charge of one gun when we pulled out and I am pleased to tell you that I have been recommended for the Military Medal. I don't know whether I will get it or not. If I do that will leave 14 Military Medals in our Battery.

Our Battery has certainly got a fine name in France for the work we have done. It was just nine months from the time I landed in France till the day I left and now I am going to take a rest for I do need it. I will write and tell you more about Scotland when I am here longer. I hope you can make this letter out for I am writing it in bed. There is a lovely bunch of nurses here. This Hospital is run by the City. Well, dear Mother don't worry about me as I said before it is not very bad and I expect to be out in a month or so. This will be all for to-day. Will write more next time. With love to all, I remain your ever true and loving son SAMUEL

NORWAY RIOTING OVER FOOD SHORTAGE

LONDON—A despatch to the Central News from Christiania says that great demonstrations against the unsatisfactory food situation were held throughout Norway, Wednesday. The Government, with a view to preventing rioting prohibited the sale of alcoholic beverages for three days and as a result of this order the restaurants were closed. The despatch adds that all stores in Christiania shut their doors, that the gas works and electrical plants are idle and that nearly all workmen are striking.
