JAPANESE AMAZED

AT ATTITUDE OF THE UNITED STATES

Adding Insult to Injury—Firm On Treaty Rights—Will Not Couple School and Coolie Questions Nor Hear of Discrimination

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—The Japanese question has not been settled by the passage of the immigration bill, with its last-handed provision for coolie exclusion. It develops that the Japanese are not regarding that legislation as a settlement of the issue in controversy, so still it is a step in the opposite direction. In their view it but adds insult to the injury of which they were already complaining. Its enactment was a deliberate performance of the very thing which the Government of Japan desired especially not to have done. Moreover, the provision of the immigration bill which is hailed throughout this country as the way out of the difficulty is regarded by the Japanese as being but the foundation for new difficulties which are likely to be more grave than the one it was designed to settle.

It is evident that there has been a decided misunderstanding somewhere, either on the part of the Administration or of some of the negotiators who have had to do with the arrangement of the proposed means of settlement. It was supposed without question by Congress that the Japanese, which was proposed first by Secretary Root, would pay the way for subsequent diplomatic efforts which would ultimately bring about a complete understanding with Japan upon all points at issue between the two countries.

There are two questions at issue, one raised by the Japanese and the other by the United States. The Japanese consider that the school question, raised by them because of the San Francisco incident, is not of a character to be settled on a basis of quid pro quo. It involves a question of what they contend to be right established to them by treaty. On our part it involves a construction of the treaty. Japan is ready to take up the matter of that construction and to content for her interpretation of it, which is that

any action by any State tending to segregate Japanese school children, or discrimination with the children of other alien residents is an invasion of the treaty rights of the Japanese. The school question therefore, is one which in the Japanese view, must be settled on its own merits, without involvement with any other matter. That, too is the view of the President.

The second issue raised by us is as to the immigration into continental United States of Japanese coolies and laborers. In the view of the Japanese that is directly a question to be settled on the basis of a quid pro quo and not otherwise. They are unwilling to have the school and immigration questions linked together in any manner. They do not regard them as susceptible of forming the basis of an exchange, and therefore have done nothing whatever on the second issue, while remaining firm in their position on the first.

The St. John Delegation Have Returned from Ottawa Satisfied

ST. JOHN, February 22.—Several members of the delegation sent from St. John to Ottawa returned this afternoon. They are very optimistic and say the outcome of their visit will in all probability be that the government will send a dredge here to assist in clearing up for the new berth to be built. The dredge will probably be kept here permanently. Also that the dredge W. S. Fielding will be sent here to dredge out the channel of the harbor. A public meeting will be held here in a day or two with Hon. H. P. Emerson present to map out a plan to present to Ottawa to secure aid at once for keeping this port up to the needed facilities pending the handling of the nationalization question. The delegates also brought word that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, on his way to the colonial conference in London, will sail from St. John April 5th.

LONDON, February 22.—A matter which is creating a good deal of talk in smart society is what appears to be a determined effort to oust the First Sea Lord, Sir John Fisher, from his post in the Admiralty.

BANK OF N S REWARDS STAFF

TORONTO, February 22.—H. C. McLeod general manager of the bank of Nova Scotia, stated this morning that in recognition of the bravery of its servants, Kingston, Jamaica, during the earthquake horror—from bank to bank downwards they stuck to their posts and put away all the books and cash—the bank of Nova Scotia has presented each member of the staff of the Jamaica branch with cheques ranging from \$100 to \$1000. Mr. McLeod stated that though the bank building was destroyed the loss otherwise sustained was insignificant.

WOLVES RAVAGE CATTLE FOLDS

Attack and Kill a Little Child Before its Mother's Eyes

MADRID, Feb. 22.—Packs of wolves are ravaging the fold and causing yards in the northern provinces of Spain. Many villages have been attacked by the brutes which are unable to obtain food in the mountains owing to the heavy fall of snow, and the peasants are forming hunting parties.

A child was devoured by wolves not far from Enrol the other day. The mother had to cross a stream over a rough tree bridge, and carried over the child. Then she returned to the other bank to fetch a parcel which she had laid down. The wolves appeared before she could return and killed the child.

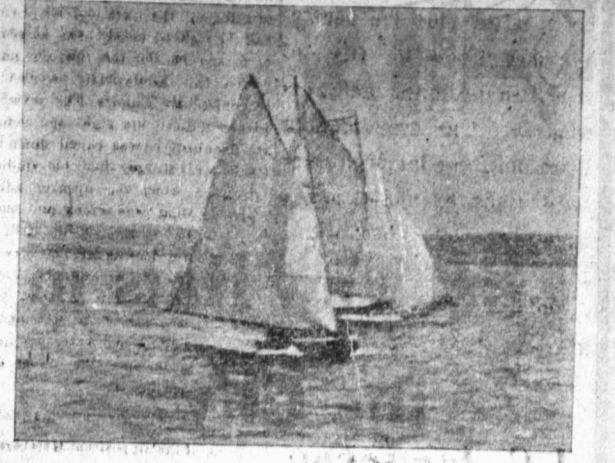
