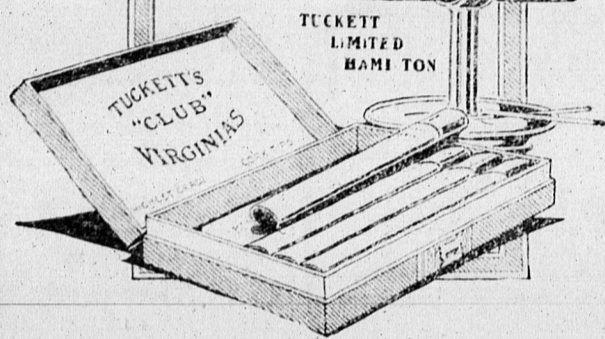

ORANGEMEN IN CANADA ARE FACING A CRISIS. TRIURO, July 17.-"If the Orange Order grows she must make herself felt, and it will take men with iron in their blood to do it. If Rome conquers Canada you will lose all your power, all your freedom. These were the closing words of a strong sermon preached by Rev. Albert Margrett in Olivet Congregational Church, last night. There was a large attendance. The subject of the sermon was, "Why the Roman Catholics think so lightly of the Orange Order," and "Orangemen, will it grow or die?" The speaker emphasized the fact the Church of Rome was losing power in South America, France, Spain and other Catholic countries, but gaining ground in Protestant strongholds. But the Roman Catholic Church made many blunders, even when its power was growing. In Canada it is blundering, as a result of these errors the Orange Order grew. As an example, the preacher cited the Ne Temere decree, which had done more perhaps than anything else could have done to bring the Protestant churches closer together. "Rome works with a gloved hand until she gets the power," said Rev. Mr. Margrett, "and then she uses the hand of iron. She used the gloved hand until she thought she had sufficient power, and then the marriage decree and practically defied the Orange Order." The Church of Rome had been making great progress in Canada. The eucharistic congress was a success, and it gave them added courage. As a result they introduced the Ne Temere decree.

It was the only church that did not condemn him." That the Orange order is now facing a crisis, was Rev. Mr. Margrett's opinion. "It must either go forward or backward," he declared. "It has been challenged, and Protestants should stand by the Orangemen as firmly as Catholics stand by the Jesuits. Something more than twelfth of July processions will be needed to stop the progress of the Roman Catholic Church, which fights 365 days in every year. Holiday processions and passing resolutions once in twelve months won't combat the everyday campaign of the Church of Rome. Meetings should be held at regular intervals in some commodious building like the Massey Hall, and the best speakers of the day should be secured to give addresses. If the Orange Order grows she must make herself felt. It will take men with iron in their blood to do it. If Rome conquers Canada you will lose all your power, all your freedom." "The Orange order does not protest against anything, but for E. A. true Orangemen is not a man against Rome, but a man who stands for equal rights for all. The Roman Catholic Church stands for a closed door, closed book and a closed mind. Orangemen stand for the open door, open book and open mind. These things are worth fighting for."

MRS. LEA IS RUSHED TO DENVER. WASHINGTON, July 18.-Mrs. Luke Lea, wife of Senator Lea, of Tennessee, is being rushed across the continent in a special car in a race against death. Senator Lea, a physician and nurse are with the sick woman, who is being hurried to Colorado as a last resort in fighting an attack of pneumonia. It was only a few weeks ago that Senator Lea's wife was near death as the result of an operation in the Georgetown Hospital. At that time the doctor declared that a fresh supply of blood was the only thing that would save her. Senator Lea offered his own blood. The urgency of the case was such that the physicians did not wait to analyze the husband's blood to ascertain if it was usable with that of the patient. An artery in Senator Lea's arm was opened and two quarts of his blood allowed to flow into the veins of his wife. The transfusion was a success and Mrs. Lea promptly rallied. The loss of blood left Senator Lea very weak. He fainted after the operation was over and was confined to bed for several days. Mrs. Lea continued to gain and was removed to Deer Park (Md.) last Monday, however, Mrs. Lea had a turn for the worse. She developed pneumonia and on Wednesday night the physicians said there was no hope of saving her life unless she could be taken at once into rarer air. Senator Lea chartered a car, obtained a physician and nurse, and started for Denver.
