Airman Admits Killing Wife

NEW YORK, Oct. 28 (AP)—New York's greatest murder thriller in recent years hit a climax when an Airman admitted to the killing of his wife.

Legal ties between Britain and the United States have been proposed by the British Empire, but he asked if such would not arouse the fears of other countries against an English speaking mastery over the other 90 per cent of the world's population. Also, he asked, wouldn't such a marriage involve us in all the problems of the British Empire and conversely that Empire be "plagued with all of the problems of the United States" leading to "many frictions and ultimately to bitter divorce?"

Mr. Hoover said as the greatest danger to peace the intense nationalism generated by the war. He said evidence of nationalism already were obvious in proclamation by United Nations. Premier Stalin has not hesitated to speak of territorial expansion over previously independent peoples.

Mr. Hoover said, and Prime Minister Churchill has stated categorically that the British Empire will not be liquidated. Gen. Chiang Kai Shek states China will restore ancient boundaries with all foreign squatters evicted and the Netherlands says she will recover her colonies.

External Trade For September

OTTAWA, Oct. 28 (CP)—Value of Canada's external trade during September, excluding gold, totalled \$384,639,552, compared with \$444,405,536 in August and \$333,858,851 in September last year. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The increase over 1942 in September was in continuation of a trend noticeable since the start of the year. During the first nine months of 1943 the total was \$3,440,076,016 while in 1942 it was \$2,412,724,404.

And the nine-month figure for 1943 this year exceeded by about \$16,000,000 the \$225,000,000 worth of external trade recorded for the full year 1941.
