Troops Well Fed Travelling By Train

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 18.—It is not disclosing a military secret to state that men of the Canadian Army are well fed when travelling even to the extent of receiving the bacon and eggs so popular in song of the First World War troops, but by them regarded as mythical. A report of the Canadian National Railways for a six months' period indicates that during the period the Commissionnaire Kitchen attached to troop trains served 249,000 lbs. of food to which was added 15,000 loaves, 3,000 gallons of milk and 4,500 dozens of eggs. To sweeten 3,000 pounds of tea and 6,000 pounds of coffee, as well as for the odd pie-the-cooks used 21,000 pounds of sugar. The breakfast bacon accounted for 3,500 pounds fortified by 6,000 pounds of sausage and 7,500 pounds of marmalade and jam, although some of the latter were used for the tea-time menu. There was also a trifle of 3,000 pounds of rolled oats for porridge and a substantial use of butter, 19,500 pounds in all. The breakfast list was topped off by 4,800 pounds of prunes.

Several offenders in this respect have been summoned before the Stipendiary Magistrate and fines and costs have been imposed. The motoring public will commend the Police for carrying out this check up in a thorough and systematic manner.

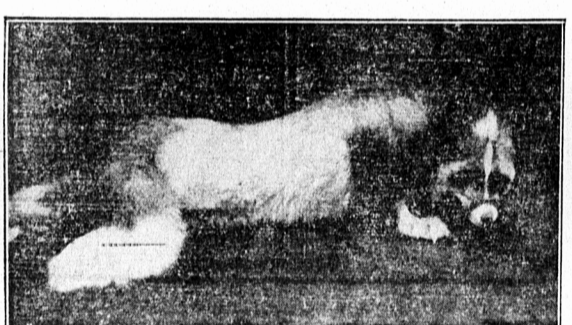

U. S. Anticipate Rush of Imports Under Fur Quota

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—(AP)—A new quota permitting the entry of such furs will be opened on Dec. 2 to give importers on all sections of the border, particularly the Canadian border, an equal chance to bring in some furs under the quota, officials ordered uniform opening times for all customs offices on that day.

Regardless of local time, the customs offices will all open at exactly 12 noon EDT.

The new quotas permit importation of 83,300 fur units from Canada and 41,700 from all other foreign countries in the year beginning Dec. 2. However, not more than 25 per cent of these quotas may be filled in any one month.
