(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 22.—Quebec Province and the Dominion have signed an agreement on unemployment relief. Early this afternoon Hon. J. H. Francoeur, Quebec Minister of Public Works and Senator Gideon D. Robertson, Dominion Minister of Labor, signed the document under which the Dominion will contribute \$2,850,000 for construction of public works to provide work in Quebec. The Province will also share in the \$4,000,000 "direct relief" fund.

"I am highly pleased with the attitude of Quebec Province," Senator Robertson declared later. "After the whole scheme of the Dominion had been explained to him, Mr. Francoeur quite readily signed the agreement. There is every evidence too that the municipalities of Quebec are already preparing to participate under our plan to provide work."

Execution of the agreement with Quebec marked the ninth agreement with the provinces which Senator Robertson has negotiated since Parliament prorogued. Premier S. F. Tolmie signed for British Columbia yesterday and all the other provinces had previously executed agreements which have been approved by the Cabinet.

The whole plan of the Dominion to alleviate unemployment is now under way from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The Canadian Pacific Railway. Senator Robertson announced, have just placed 1250 men in employment east of Fort William under the \$20,000,000 construction program of the Railways. The Canadian National, he intimated, had placed approximately the same number of men on their part of the work. "By reason of the tariff changes," Senator Robertson, further declared, "all men available for work in the textile industry have been given employment, and within a very short time there will be shortage of men for work in this industry."

(Canadian Press) KIUKIANG, China, Oct. 22.—Bishop Mignani of the Italian Lazarist Mission at Kian Kiang Province, one of the sixteen missionaries abducted when Communist outlaws ransacked the central Kiangsi City, said here today 2,000 residents of Kian had been slaughtered by the invaders. Bishop Mignani said Communist forces captured the city October 6 and the slaughter followed immediately. Since then he said intermittent killing had continued. The Bishop and one Chinese priest of the Lazarist mission were released by their abductors to come here and seek to raise \$10,000,000 as ransom money for the fourteen prisoners.

(Special to the Guardian) SHANGHAI, Oct. 22.—Eight thousand Chinese men and women have been massacred at Kian Province of Kiangsi by Communists in an orgy of slaying, looting and burning, said dispatches received today. The "Reds" swarmed into Kian, October 6, ransacked the city and ruthlessly killed 2,000 inhabitants in one day. Thousands of others were slain as depredations continued.

THE IMPERIAL CONFERENCE

(By George Hambleton, Canadian Press Staff Correspondent) LONDON, Oct. 22.—The Imperial Conference begins to give true promise of a practical result in the betterment of Empire Trade. Among the various delegations tonight there was a feeling of confidence that something concrete would be accomplished. The imposition of taxes on foreign food products by the British Government, with a view to giving preference to the Dominions as proposed by Canada, is accepted as virtually out of the question, after the pronouncements of certain Ministers of the Labor Government. The more likely course is believed to be the establishment by Great Britain of some system of quota purchasing, giving preference to Dominion products. But the whole problem is still very much sub judice, and no forecast of the result could possibly be made as yet.

Today a sub-committee of British, Canadian and Australian statistical experts was appointed to solve an odd conflict in official statistics, which must be straightened out before the United Kingdom can fix preferential quotas for Empire wheat on the British market—should the quota system finally receive the approval of the Conference. The figures chiefly at issue are those of Canada and the United Kingdom. Canadian statistics give last year's exports of wheat from Canada to the United Kingdom as 122,000,000 bushels. The British Board of Trade returns show only 50,000,000 bushels received. The real figure lies somewhere between the two, possibly it will be around 80,000,000.

BANK MANAGER SUICIDES IN HIS OFFICE

Heavy Losses Through Stock Market Dealings Caused Victor Stanley, Bank of Toronto Manager To Take His Own Life.

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 22.—The heavy losses J. Victor Stanley, branch manager here for the Bank of Toronto, suffered in late months through stock market dealings, caused him to take his life in the bank office early today. After writing a note to his wife saying, "hope I will be forgiven for going out this way," he placed a revolver in his mouth and pulled the trigger.

The fact that Mr. Stanley had recently carried on losing operations in stocks was revealed in the note his wife, found lying beside the body. It said the consequent worry was driving him crazy, and that he could not stand life any longer. Mr. Stanley was a veteran member of the Bank of Toronto staff. He was manager of the Bank's branch in the Union Station. About 50 years of age, he was a popular figure in club circles in the Capital. He was President of one of the City Service Clubs and only yesterday presided at a luncheon of its members. Deceased was a native of Carleton Place, Ont. In addition to his widow he leaves one son.

Last Minute News Flashes

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 22.—The Hon. Richard Stafford Cripps, son of Lord Parmoor, today was appointed Solicitor General to succeed Sir James McNeill, resigned. The Solicitor General is a member of the Ministry, but not of the Cabinet.
PARIS Oct. 22.—The Government today decided to erect a stone memorial to the victims of the British airship R-101 on the field where the dirigible met disaster.
PORTSMOUTH, N.H., Oct. 22.—The Navy's new fleet submarine, V5 was believed to have broken all depth records, for United States submarines at least, today when she descended to the ocean floor in 333 feet of water.

Insurance Companies Not Hit Very Hard

As Result Of R-101 Disaster Which Took Forty-Eight Lives—About \$105,000 Is Payable On Civilians Who Died.

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Oct. 22.—Insurance circles said today that British underwriting interests would not suffer heavily as a result of the disaster which destroyed the dirigible R-101 and took forty-eight lives. As far as can be determined, about 21,000 pounds (\$105,000) is payable on the civilians who died. This sum is covered in accident policies, while the loss of the crew and the airship itself is taken care of by the Government.

Largest Policy It is understood that the largest policy was carried by Lord Thomson, Air Minister, who telephoned an insurance Co. a few hours before the dirigible started toward India and increased the accident policy he already had. The total amount has not been learned. It was also said that the accident would not have much effect on aviation premiums in England, since the country has only one dirigible left, and many heavier than air machines are in an entirely different class.
Still Optimistic It was added that the R-101 disaster had not lessened faith in aeroplane transport. The Government announced today that the inquiry into the R-101 disaster will be opened at the Law Courts on Monday. The Air Ministry will direct an investigation into the cause of destruction of the world's largest dirigible at Reims, France.

SHAMROCK V RUNS INTO BAD WEATHER

Was Battered By Terrible Seas On Her Return Journey Across The Atlantic.

(Associated Press) SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., Oct. 22.—Battered by terrific seas encountered on the way across the Atlantic, the Shamrock V arrived today minus her original steering wheel, which was washed away when she was 24 hours out of Bristol, Rhode Island. Captain William Greenock, who brought the America's Cup challenger home, said that the yacht ran into bad weather practically all the way over. At times the boat was held to a standstill.

ANOTHER MURDER AT SYDNEY

(Canadian Press) SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 22.—Michael Dzianykiewicz, fifty-three year old Galician, died in the City Hospital here today under the name of Michael Ruskapno, of wounds received in an affray in the Coke Oven district last Sunday. His real name and identity were not established until his body was identified at the morgue by the real Ruskapno, who had heard his own name mentioned in connection with the case. A Coroner's jury tonight returned an open verdict in the Galacian's death, recommending further investigation by Crown authorities. Police are holding Milan Bilivsky, who, according to evidence given by Vorko Shumko, a companion of the dead man, struck the Galacian with an axe. Metro Puperto, who was also present at the affray is being held as a material witness.

Track Betting Is Below Average

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 22.—Betting at race tracks in Canada in 1930 fell far below that of 1929. During 332 days racing this year the total amount wagered was only \$38,007,146 compared with \$45,880,845 during 335 days in 1929.
