**THE MARKETS**  
 MONTREAL, Feb. 23.—The foreign buyers for grain here today showed further improvement and some business was done with the United Kingdom and the continent in wheat and oats for nearby shipment in the domestic market sales of Manitoba No. 4 wheat were made to New York exporters at 14 1/2 cents per bushel under the Winnipeg May option, c. i. f. Bay Ports, and car lots of oats changed hands for all rail shipment from Port William. The local and country demand for coarse grains was steady and prices ruled firm. A feature of the flour trade was the continued steady demand from foreign buyers for spring wheat grades and a fair volume of business was accomplished for both all nearby and deferred shipment. The local demand was also good and prices were firm. A fair trade was also done in winter wheat flour. Active trade was done in all lines of millfeed and the undertone was firm. The market for standard grades of rolled oats was quiet and values were steady. The undertone to the egg market was firm under a good demand from all sources. The receipts with the advance from New Brunswick and the strength in the United States potato markets a firm feeling prevailed in the local situation and prices were fully maintained. Sales of car lots of Quebec varieties were made at \$1.20 to \$1.25 per bag of 90 lbs. in bulk extract. The demand was good for Quebec grades. The market for imported beans continued active and firm. Car lots of choice white handpicked were quoted at \$3.10 per bushel extract, and broken lots sold at \$3.20 per bushel extract. The demand for butter continued of a limited character but prices were unchanged. There was improved demand from English buyers for cheese and a moderate amount of business was worked. The domestic trade was quiet. The receipts were 28 boxes.

**OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 23 (Eggs)**—Following a drop in the Chicago market there has been some buying of American eggs here brought in to Canada to meet the heavy consumption demand expected during Lent.

**MONTREAL**—Fresh eggs are light and from present appearances the market should be steady during the balance of the week.
