es for improved stock, asked for his assistance in selecting a carload of stock. In this way a great deal was done for the province during the last few years. Three carloads of pure bred stock were imported during the past year. The Government did not need to advance the money for this work; the people were interested. They undertook to co-operate, undertook to buy their own stock with the assistance of the department in selecting it, and some assistance towards the expense of bringing it in. That assistance was given by the government on every occasion, not only in dairy stock, but in other stock—hogs, sheep and poultry.

These associations were given every assistance by the Department during the past number of years, and when we compare the assistance given them with the assistance given by the previous government, we find the comparison is most favorable to the present Government.

One of the largest associations we have is the Dairying Association. How much assistance did the honorable gentleman opposite give to that association? They claim the whole credit for that, forgetting it was organized before they came into power, that it was as well supported before they came into power as it was any time they were in power. In all their time they gave only about \$500. Since the

present Government came into power, within a few years this assistance has been increased to something like \$2,500. How can they put themselves right with these facts staring them in the face?

In connection with a dairy meeting held in Prince of Wales College Hall, when additional assistance was asked for, the Patriot reported the meeting, and said there were six paid officials connected with the department present; just to show the public that there were already too many men, and it was proposed to get more.

There is another association we heard a good deal of during this session. It is one of the many charges brought against the Department that is the Live Stock Association. It is charged that a lot of new associations had been formed, and the old Live Stock Association was allowed to disband. This statement is not correct; indeed, there is no part of it correct. This Live Stock Association was allowed to go down, there is no doubt about that, but it was allowed to go down before this Government came into power. The only meeting I attended was a meeting to start new associations; the old association was discussed, and it was not discussed in the way people generally refer to the dead. The dead are praised, but in this case the association was dead, and it was said of it that it was never of any use. It included all kinds of live stock, and the interests of one clashed with the others; they were never able to do any work. When they met perhaps the horse breeders would take charge of the meeting; it would be about either a horse race or an exhibition, and other matters were left in the background. And for that reason they decided they would not any longer attempt to work that association, but divided up and formed different associations for the different branches of live stock. This appeared very reasonable. Then every branch of the live stock would receive some consideration.

We have already received more benefit from these associations than we did from the old association that included all; we can take, for instance, the Sheep Breeders' Association. We have received a good deal of benefit from the work of that association. In the matter of marketing wool, previously wool was sold ungraded and unselected, and in that condition we did not receive the price. This association took up that matter, put the wool on the market in the condition the manufacturer wanted it, and the manufacturer bought our wool. They bought last year over 50,000 pounds of wool bought it on grade without seeing it, and paid the highest price, knowing it was in the condition they required.

Another of the Live Stock Associations that was started here was the Poultry Association. The honorable gentleman opposite are only too willing to say we had nothing to do with the starting of that association. They are only too willing and too ready to say on other occasions we are to blame for it—all for the simple reason that they find in some places that certain business men are not in favor of it. They are doing that with the intention of trying to get the business men against this association, and its promoters.

The management of Canadian National Railways is placing in service immediately 150 sleeping cars of a new class for the transportation of troops over long distances by rail. These cars have been specially designed to meet troop transport conditions. Built of steel with the exception of the interior fittings, electrically lighted, and with ample lavatory accommodations, these cars embody the latest ideas developed in connection with the handling of passenger traffic, and represent probably the first attempt that has been made by any railway to furnish equipment especially calculated to meet the exacting requirements involved in the transportation of troops.

These new steel sleepers are now being turned over to the Canadian National Railways from the makers. As each will "sleep" comfortably 54 passengers.

The idea was to furnish the best equipment possible to take care of the returning Canadian soldiers by rail from the ocean ports. The necessities of the case were emphasized, and the builders have co-operated loyally in producing this special equipment in rapid time.

Details in connection with new cars: Dimensions.

TRUCKS.

These cars are equipped with the latest Commonwealth all steel 6-wheel truck and clasp brake, so arranged with brake shoes on each side of the wheel as to provide the most up-to-date method of stopping a passenger train in the shortest distance possible. Trucks are attached to body of car through the centre plate to prevent the trucks being separated from body of car in case of derailment, and so provide sufficient weight to keep the car from over-turning.

LIGHTING

They are electrically lighted, and equipped with 300 Ampere Hour Batteries having sufficient storage capacity for 8 hours burning without generating any further current. Lights are so arranged that at night half light can be cut off, or each individual light can be cut off, if so desired.

HEATING

They are equipped with latest type of vapor heating, and cooking range in opposite end of car.

SEATS

The seats are upholstered in Fabricoid and Pantesote and filled with curled hair which permits very easy riding and comfort to passengers. When travelling long distances this feature is desirable, and this makes for comfort when in use as bed.
