RHODES SCHOLARSHIPS.—The election of Rhodes Scholars, postponed on account of the war, will be resumed throughout Canada during the present year. The application of candidates should be made to the Chief Superintendent of Education for the Province, who will transmit them to the Trust in London. The scholars for 1920 and 1921 will be elected in October 1920. The conditions of eligibility throughout Canada remain as in past years, except that extension of the age limit may be granted to candidates for 1918 and 1919 who have been engaged in war service.
