### Wild Parrots Of London

LONDON, Aug. 10.—Within the next year or two, "feeling the parrots" may have become one of the regular pleasures of London as "feeding the pigeons" is now. Several parrots—five or six pairs—have escaped from the Zoo into the

adjoining Regent's Park, and as they are very nearly hardy, it is quite possible that they may settle down and bring up families in the parks, as the grey American squirrels have done within the last few years. Lord Lifford, who has already introduced a new species of owl to this country, has established small flocks of parrots in a wild state in his park in Northamptonshire, by no means the warmest or sunniest country of England.

### Gold Cure For Cancer

(United Press) —MADISON, Wis., Aug. 10.—Colloidal gold, a substance known to science since the days of the early Romans, has proved more effective in treating many cases of cancer than radium, according to Prof. Louis A. Kahlenberg, medical chemist.

In conjunction with Dr. Edward Ochsner, of Augustana hospital, Chicago, Prof. Kahlenberg has experienced with the "liquid gold" and believes he has found a substance which will eventually make it possible to remove cancerous growths which the surgeon's knife cannot reach.

The gold colloid, properly applied, has been successful in causing cancerous growths in the intestinal tract to disappear, he declares.

The liquid which looks like port wine, is administered internally in these cases in regular doses. In cases of advanced cancer, intravenous injection is used.

### BRINGING UP FATHER



### Secret Romance

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, August 10.—For the entry of the marriage of Col. Francis Compton Seymour to Leonora or Eleonora Hudson, which took place between September, 1877, and June, 1795, a reward of \$1,000 is offered by a firm of solicitors, who have sent a circular to that effect to parish clerks and others.

The bride was the widow of a seaman, and the groom one of the Seymours, Dean of Wells, and grandson of Sir Edward Seymour, the baronet who claimed the dukedom of Somerset on the death of his kinsman, the seventh Duke and succeeded in establishing his claim.

Leonora Perkins was the daughter of George Perkins of Woolwich, and in 1768 married John Hudson, a seaman on an East India man. Hudson sailed for Cal-

cutta in 1885. At Calcutta half the crew deserted, and the ship's register shows that John Hudson died on September 27, 1786, and the body buried in Calcutta was John Hudson's. There is reason to believe that the man who was buried in Calcutta was the same as the man who was buried in Calcutta.

His wife, describing herself as a widow, married on Sept. 3, 1787, Col. Francis Seymour.

The question has arisen whether to suppose that at an unknown date he returned home, like another Enoch Arden. In 1790 he was returned as paying land tax in respect of No. 113 (formerly No. 9) Paddington-street, Marylebone.

Two years later his widow takes his place as a land-tax payer in the name of "Leonora Hudson."

It is believed that Col. Francis Seymour and his wife discovered that the sailor from Calcutta had returned, and that when Hudson died they were remarried.

It is this second certificate which is required. The date must be between September, 1787, and June

16, 1795, for on the latter date Leonora Seymour died.

Recently the present Duke of Somerset made application to the House of Lords Committee of Privileges to dispense with certain legal proof of the eighth Duke's descent, and it is probable that the large reward is offered in connection with the inquiries that have been made into that application.
