Presbytery Meeting

The Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in regular session in Heartz Memorial Hall on Friday October 21, at 11.00 a. m. The meeting opened with a worship service and then the court was declared constituted by the Chairman, Rev. E. R. Woods. The docket was read and it contained many important matters. Rev. G. N. Somers, Margate requested a hearing on his resignation at the end of the conference year. The request was granted with regret. Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson requested that presbytery forward his name to conference for superannuation the same to take effect at the end of this conference year. Expressions of appreciation of the noble work of Mr. Nicholson were made by members of presbytery. Rev. W. E. Aitken of St. Peter's Bay requested that he be released from his present pastoral charge that he might accept a call from Edmuntston, N. B. Delegates from the St. Peter's Bay charge were present and expressed their appreciation of the excellent work done by Rev. and Mrs. Aitken. Members of the Presbytery expressed their appreciation to Mr. Aitken especially for his splendid contribution to Young People's work and as Secretary of Presbytery. His request was granted with regret.

Mission Work we are retreating. Many men are overworked, ministers are underpaid, men have been recalled for lack of funds. We have not the common decency to blush at the hardship of our ministers. We are not dealing honourably with our ministers and our missionaries. We must get back our self-respect. If we put first things first—the Kingdom of God before self, financial problems will solve themselves. Mr. Brown spoke of the Missionary and Maintenance financial project—four million dollars to be raised over a period of a few years and said that sacrifice and enthusiasm will make it possible.

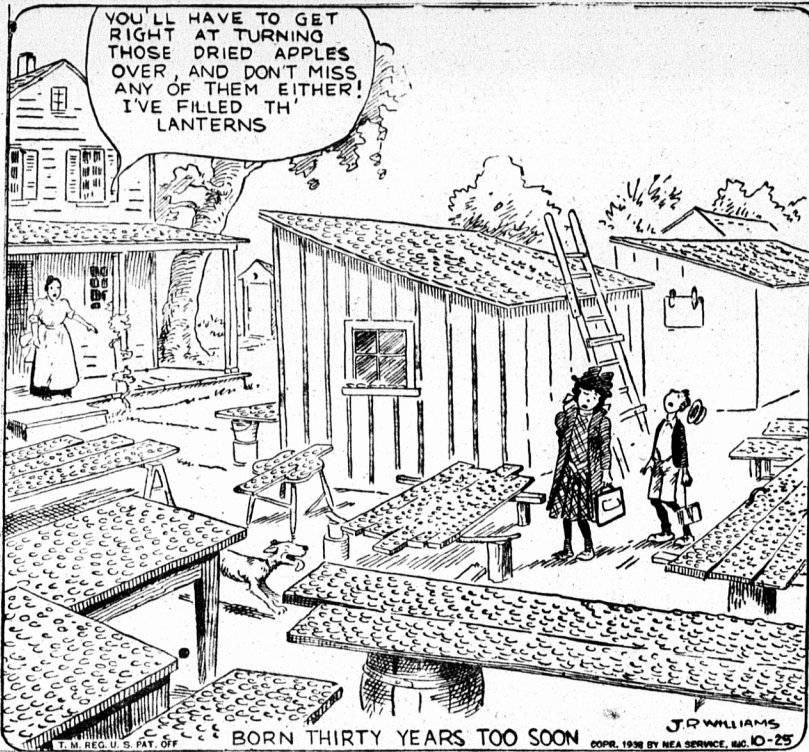

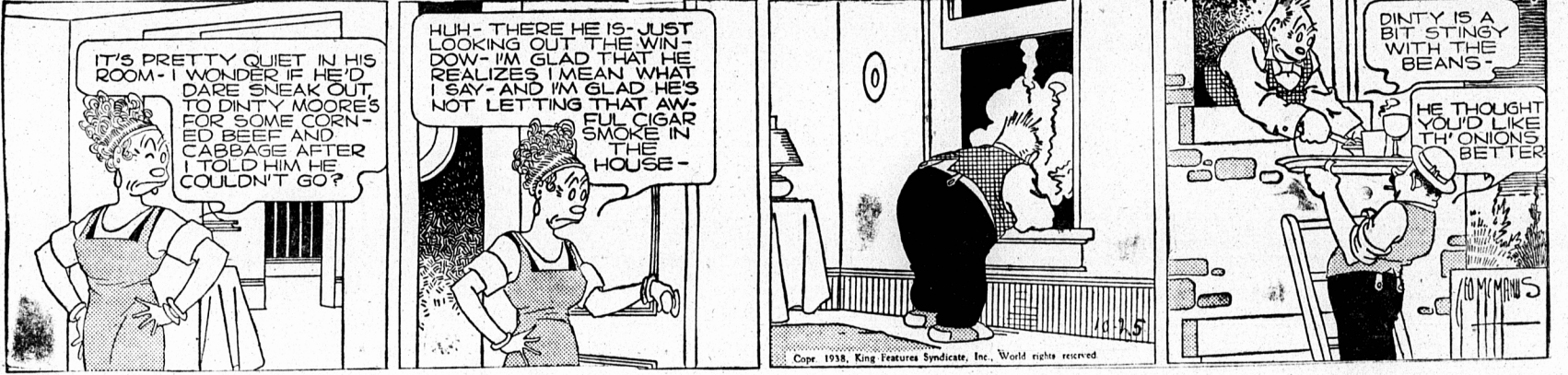

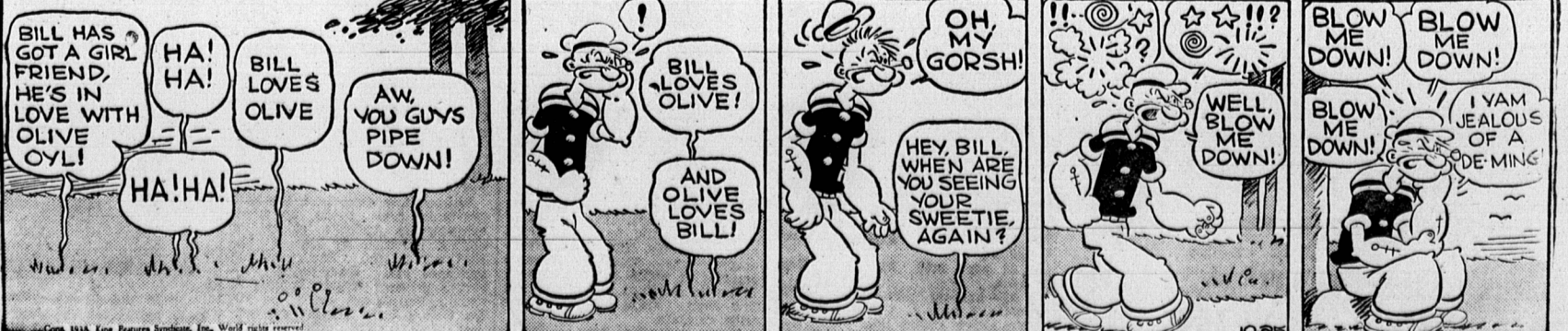
