To remove a scorched spot from white linen spread over the spot a paste made of the juice pressed from two onions, a quarter ounce of white soap, two ounces of fullers earth and a half pint of vinegar. Mix and oil till thoroughly blended.

**Life In The
Foreign Legion**

LONDON, May 2. — With fifty cents in his pocket and one eye less than when he left, a young Englishman has just arrived home after three and a half years of adventure abroad, as a member of the French Foreign Legion.

His name is Harry Poole, but in the Legion they knew him as Maurice van der Doncker, of the 10th Company, 3rd Battalion, 2nd Regiment.

Almost all the non-commissioned officers and many of the officers in his corps were Germans, and the discipline was more than prussian in its rigour.

"On my first march," he says, "after doing 30 kilometres in the blazing sun, I fell exhausted on the track. A German sergeant kicked me until I got to my feet and staggered on."

"For complaining against a lieutenant who sentenced me to eight days' punishment which meant eight days' road-making under the kicks and blows with rifle butts of Senegalese troops—I got an additional eight days from my colonel."

"But as soon as I was removed the C. O. reprimanded the lieutenant, telling him it was he and not I who was in the wrong. So the clerk told me afterwards."

"Pay, when I was there, worked out at the rate of 19 cents a fortnight."

"I was captured by the Rifis while on guard duty, protecting a convoy."

"We were all asked if we should fight for Abdel Krim or take the alternative of death. One German agreed; the other refused; he disappeared that night, and I never saw him again."

"One poor fellow, a Russian prisoner, was wounded in the shoulder and it was impossible for him to carry more than one bucket. When he showed his guards this their reply was to send him crashing to the ground with a rifle-butt blow on the chest. His fall, another Russian, sprang to his aid. There was a shot, and he dropped dead."

"That is the way things are done in Morocco."

"Finally, 17 of us saw our chance to escape when a French Column attacked our captors. Seven of us were successful, and I was one of the seven. I leapt into a water-course and swam until I could hear no more shooting."

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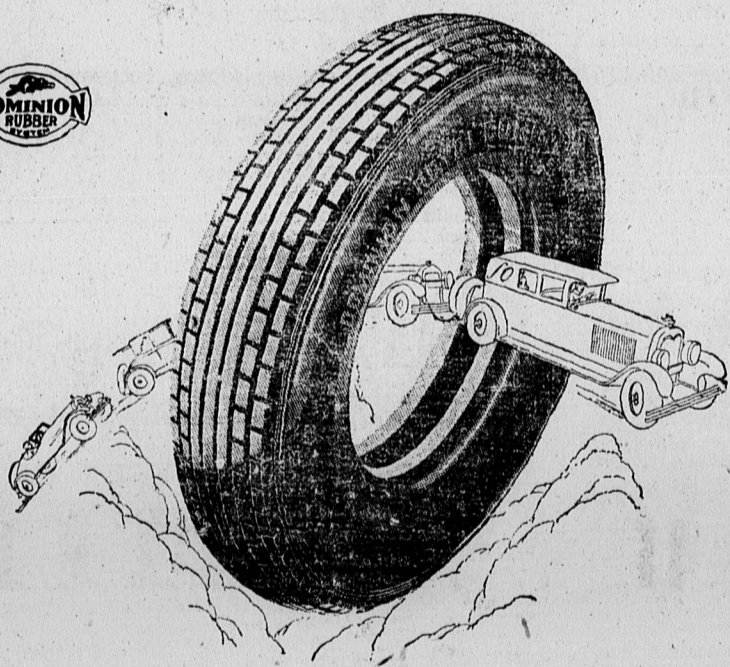
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**MERGER OF FAIRS IS
