He was born at Oswestry County Shropshire, England, in 1819, and was the first to introduce the successful catching of all kinds of fish in this part of the country. He was very successful in his career and several of his sons are now carrying on the business which he founded in the different parts of northern New Brunswick. Mr. Windsor was a member of the Methodist church. He built at mostly his own expense the church at Dalhousie. He was a great temperance worker, doing everything possible to further the cause. Mr. Windsor was twice married. Nine children survive including Mrs. Fisher, wife of Rev. G. W. Fisher, Milltown, N. B. and formerly stationed at Tryon, P. E. Island.
