THE COOK'S CORNER

FLUFFY MASHED POTATOES

6 potatoes
1-2 tablespoons butter
1-2 teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
Hot milk
1 egg or 2 egg yolks
Method: Pare potatoes and boil
until tender in salted water. Strain
then shake over low heat until
whitened and dry. Put through a
sieve and whip until light and fluffy
with the butter, seasonings, and
enough hot milk to moisten. Beat
in the egg or the 2 egg yolks and
again beat until very fluffy. Pipe
lightly in a greased baking dish.
Brush over with melted butter and
brown in the oven.

APPLE SNOW

6 tart apples
1-3 cup water
1-3 cup sugar
1-8 teaspoon salt
Grated rind of 1 lemon
2 egg whites
Method: Cut apples into eighths
and cook in water until soft. Do
not remove the skins. Now press
through a fine sieve to remove
cores and skins and add the sugar
salt and grated lemon rind to the
sieved pulp. Stir to dissolve the
sugar and when cool, fold in the
stiffly beaten egg whites. Place this
in sherbet glasses and serve with
custard sauce.

CUSTARD SAUCE

1 cup milk
2 egg yolks
2 tablespoons sugar
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-2 teaspoon vanilla
Method: Scald the milk in the
top part of a double boiler over
boiling water. Beat the egg yolks
slightly with the sugar and add the
salt. Add the scalded milk to the
egg yolk mixture and again place
in the top part of the double
boiler. Cook over hot water, stir-
ring constantly until the custard is
thick enough to coat a spoon. Re-
move from the heat, add the vanilla
and cool before using.

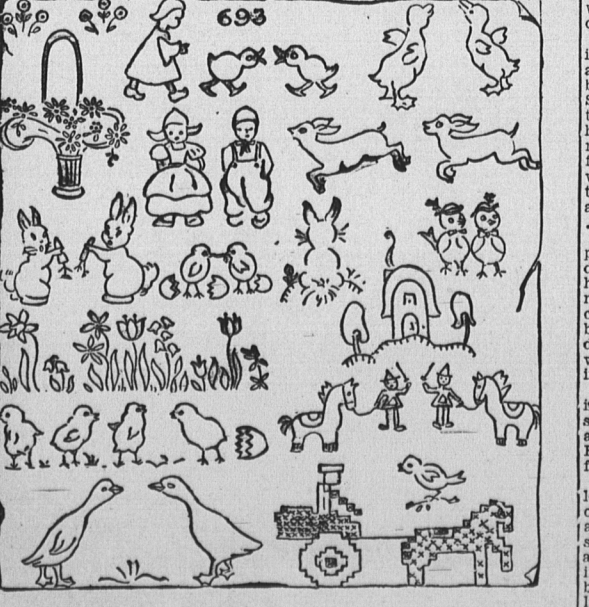
