In Memoriam

MR. HIRAM BLAISCELL At the P. E. Island Hospital at 10.30 Saturday morning, Hiram Blaiscell, aged 87 years, who leaves to mourn three sisters: Mrs. Peter Curis, New Zealand; Mrs. Herman Wilson, of Souris; Mrs. Joseph Swallow of Charlottetown and one brother, George at Bay Fortune.

MRS. JOHN ELLIS At Northam on Feb. 11, 1921, there passed peacefully away Mrs. John Ellis formerly Miss Susan Ann Kay, one of the oldest and most respected citizen in the community of the ripe age of 81 years and 25 days. She was born in Lot 11 on Jan. 17, 1840, where she spent her younger days with her parents. In 1857 she married John Ellis then of Bideford living there two years then moving to Northam where she resided until the time of her death. She had a family of three girls and nine boys all of whom are living except one who predeceased her 17 years ago. Four of the boys are in the United States, one in Ontario and the others on Prince Edward Island. Besides the children she leaves an aged husband and three sisters and other relatives to mourn their loss. The funeral which took place on Wednesday the 16th was one of the largest that wended its way to St. John's Episcopal Church for a long time. Rev. Mr. Wood of Alberton officiated. She will be greatly missed by the community where she was so well and favorably known. The pall bearers were Messrs. Dan McLean, Preston Ellis, Russell Ellis, Jas. Sullivan, Geo. McArthur and Percy Adams; all of whom were nephews of deceased.

ROBERT P. JENNINGS Robert P. Jennings, son of the late Hugh Jennings and Isabella Mooney of Morell, P. E. I. died in San Francisco, Cal., U. S. A. Jan. 28, 1921, after a short illness. He was a native of Morell and lived there until he was 17 years old when he went to New York, later going to the Pacific Coast. Mr. Jennings, one brother Bernard J. Jennings of Staten Island, New York and two sisters Mrs. Wm. H. Cony and Mrs. Hugh A. McDonald both of Bridgeport, Conn. He is also survived by three uncles, Robert and Patrick Mooney all of P. E. I. and three aunts Mrs. Catherine Mulligan of P. E. I., Mrs. Dennis Meehan of Halifax, and Miss Margaret Jennings of Jersey City, N. J. Mr. Jennings was marine engineer by profession and chief engineer of the U. S. Logan which position he held until his death. During the Spanish American war, Mr. Jennings served with the American Forces and was cited for distinguished service in the battle of Manila Bay, for

which he received a medal from the U. S. Government. He was a member of the San Francisco Council No. 615 of the Knights of Columbus, Valley Lodge No. 559 Order of Elks and the Marine Engineer's Council No. 35. Interment was in San Francisco.
