It is taken for granted that the abdication of the Kaiser will insist upon before they commit themselves to any serious consideration of peace terms. But his mere resignation to the title of Emperor of Germany will not be considered of much importance unless the German people also renounce Kaiserism. The notion that he should abdicate in favor of the Crown Prince and thereby placate the Allies is a fantastic one.

Kings Name Successors

Constantine of Greece abdicated, but was not permitted to hand on the succession of his eldest son, but the Allies have permitted the second son to succeed him, acting on the assumption that the people of Greece had not demanded that the monarchy should be abolished, and were entitled to a king if they wanted one.

Victory Loan 1919 is Bridge Between War and Peace.

Agricultural and Industrial Prosperity of Canada Depends on Success of the Loan.

Many men through disability are unable to return to their pre-war occupations. The Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment is doing a fine work in training returned soldiers in trades and professions that they can earn a living at, and is following up the training and helping that they obtain remunerative employment. The maintaining of this branch of reconstructive service calls for much funds, and the Victory Loan will be used to pay for it as well as the other purposes.

Under the Soldiers' Land Settlement Act, enough money is lent to returned soldiers to enable them to buy and stock a farm. This money will be repaid at a low rate of interest. The soldier in this given a chance to re-instate himself in civil life, and production is given a boost. Of the total amount of the forthcoming loan, \$24,000,000 has been apportioned to finance these soldier-farmers.

Pensions to the disabled and dependents of our glorious dead, as well as the authorized gratuities will be other items on the expense sheet. These are some of the obligations owing to the returned soldier who is now in health.

The maintaining of Canada's prosperity is an important reason why the Victory Loan should be a smashing success. The money is needed to finance the credits to overseas countries so that they may continue their trade relations with us. If Canada cannot give these credits other countries will, and then Canada will lose all that great overseas trade that has been the mainstay of our agricultural and industrial life for so long.

Money From Victory Loan Will Be Used to Re-establish Soldiers.

Our soldiers in France faced perils greater than those of shell and gas and machine-gun fire. There was the specter of tuberculosis, up to August, 1918, 3,909 soldiers suffering from this disease had been returned to Canada. These were placed in sanatoriums under the direction of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, and they are one of the departments of that branch that must be maintained, and come under the head of capital war outlay.

All of these men and some 20,000 others, disabled or ill, will be looked after with money raised through the Victory Loan, 1919. It is the sacred duty of Canadians that the money is forthcoming.
