C. C. CASTLE, warehouse commissioner, Winnipeg will shortly issue a report on the acreage sown in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories this year. Mr. Castle says he estimated the total acreage would be 5,800,000. Last year's acreage approximated 4,500,000, so that this year will show an increase of more than 1,000,000 acres. Allowing 1,300,000 acres for coarse grains, this leaves 4,500,000 acres seeded to wheat, which is a most conservative allowance. Taking this 4,500,000 acres at twenty bushels to the acre, would give the west a crop of 90,000,000, or a very conservative estimate, all being well, would be 80,000,000 bushels. From this it will be seen that should the west be favored with the right kind of weather, the largest crop in its history will be reaped this year.

THE officers of the Eastern line steamer St. Croix, which arrived from Boston Thursday evening with large passenger and freight lists, were amused at the story sent out from Boston regarding the so called severe storm the steamer had passed through Wednesday night when about midway between Quoddy and Lubec. According to the published accounts the steamer encountered terrific seas and lightning and thunder of an appalling character; all of which ended to create among the passengers fear and dismay. One of the officers, in discussing the matter last evening, said that there was moderate lightning, and light rain. The thunder was chiefly in the imagination, and the sea was smooth. What was encountered in reality was something very ordinary and not calculated to arouse particular apprehension.—St. John Telegraph.

THE steamer Lunenburg, which ran in the passenger and freight service between Charlottetown, Pictou, Northern Cape Breton ports and the Sydney last summer, has resumed regular sailings over the same route again this summer. In addition to calling at all the above mentioned ports, however, the steamer will extend her route to Placentia, Nfld., and will run to that port on every trip, calling at Sydney both going and returning. The Lunenburg arrived at Sydney this morning on her first trip and after landing a few passengers and discharging a quantity of freight sailed for Placentia via North Sydney. In a short time the Lunenburg's place will be taken by the Amelia, a new steamer which is being built expressly for the route.—Sydney Record.

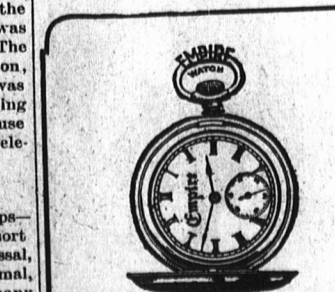
THE death took place at Caledonia, June 2nd of James McLennan, aged 50 years. The deceased was an honest, upright God fearing Christian who had great regard for the public ordinances of the house of God where he was to be seen every Sabbath with his children sitting along with him in the family pew. The respect in which he was held in the neighborhood was seen by the people giving up their work as long as the remains were in the home, and also by the great crowd of people who came to the funeral although the season was very busy. It is a peninsula of about 100 acres. The I. C. R. runs through one corner, and otherwise the place is surrounded by water. There is good bathing as well as fishing and boating, while the fields are suitable for athletics, and there are groves well adapted for picnicking. The program will include, camp fires, evening concerts, hares and hounds and field sports. The camp will be held between July 11th and 25th, and the getting-off station is Woodburn. Each boy is supposed to take as an outfit, a box or small trunk, two heavy quilts and blankets, brush and comb, soap, tooth brush, towels, swimming suit, overcoat or rubber coat, old clothes, heavy shoes, pillow and Bible, games and musical instruments.
