BROTHERS DROWNED IN EACH OTHER'S ARMS.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., April 24—Geo Chalk, aged twenty-one and Malow Chalk, aged eight, sons of Stanley Chalk, farmer, Port Burwell, were drowned in Otter Creek. They left their home on the Burwell farm in the afternoon to go to a little island in the centre of the creek, and it is supposed that while on the return trip their boat upset, and neither being able to swim, they were drowned. They were not missed until night, when search was instituted, with the result that the bodies, locked in each other's arms, were found this morning in ten feet of water.

C. P. B. CLERK IN MONTREAL CHARGED WITH \$1,200 THEFT.

MONTREAL, April 25—Charged with the theft of \$1,200 from the Canadian Pacific Railway, Armand Blair who had been employed for the past ten years as a clerk in the baggage department was brought before Judge Lafontaine in the arraignment court today and pleaded not guilty. FRIEDMANN MAKES CURE

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 25—Fred W. Lang, Jr., of North Tonawanda, who was taken in February to Pasadena, California, suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis in an advanced stage, has returned apparently cured by the Friedmann treatment. When he left he was so weak could hardly walk, and Dr. C. T. Crance, who attended him, said there was little hope for him.

Dr. Crance obtained from Dr. Friedmann, however, sufficient vaccine to treat three patients and selected Lang as one of the patients. Lang had just suffered two hemorrhages, and was very weak. In a few days he had gained two pounds. Another injection was given and later a third. After remaining in the observation of the California doctor, Lang was allowed to return to his home near the city, apparently a well man.

FRENCH AVIATOR MAKES A RECORD FLIGHT

PARIS, April 24—Eugene Gilbert, the French aviator, today beat all records for a continuous cross-country flight, flying from Villa Coudray to Victoria, Spain. The distance between the two places is about 825 kilometres (513 miles), which Gilbert covered in eight and a half hours. After a short rest Gilbert ascended again and at nightfall had reached Salamanca.
