The session of the Shell-fish Commission was resumed yesterday morning, Mr. O'Leary taking the place of Mr. Wilson. Evidence was given by a number of witnesses, the first of whom was C. H. B. Longworth. He favored the opening of the season on April 27th and closing July 1st. He thought much injury was done by taking small lobsters. He did not believe in granting additional licenses. No further protection other than a short season is necessary and the onus of protecting spawn lobsters should be placed on the fisherman under a penalty of a fine. The hatcheries should be in charge of an expert.

H. W. Longworth favored for west of Cape Traverse, a season opening July 25th and closing September 30th. He would not favor two seasons on the south side, which is the natural breeding ground of lobsters. If more protection than at present is needed it should be by shortening the season. There are too many traps and factories at present and he would not grant additional licenses to persons now holding them.

James P. McIntyre, Souris, was satisfied with the present season. Simon. Pineau, North Rustico, favored a season from January 1st to July 1st. Spawn lobsters should be put back in the water. No new licenses should be granted except where absolutely necessary. Thomas Howatt, Cape Traverse, recommended a season from July 25th to Sept. 30th. Frank Pigott, Mount Stewart, favored May 1st to July 10th as a season for the North side. E. T. Carbonell said the warden system is useless. The inspectors should engage wardens. The Commission meets at Souris on Friday.
