**MEMORABLE MEETING OF MARITIME SYNOD**

NEW GLASGOW, Oct. 3.—A great and memorable day in the history of the Maritime Synod was crowned by a great service in the evening. The meeting opened with singing. Prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. Whittier, followed by a male quartette of very fine quality. Rev. G. E. Forbes the Con- venerator of the Foreign Mission Com- mittee, presented the report in optimistic terms. Special mention was made of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society. They reported at their annual meeting that a total of \$31,596 was raised last year, an increase of \$5,202. In addition the women have decided to raise \$4,000 extra for women's work in Korea this year.

Mr. Kenneth Baird spoke briefly seconding the resolutions moved by the convenor. Another resolution recorded appreciation of the splendid work of the women of the church.

Rev. D. G. Cook of India gave a most interesting and inspiring address. "India is as loyal in heart in this world war as all are in Canada. The leavening power of the Gospel of Christ accounts for this steadfast and satisfactory attitude of the Indians." Dr. K. J. Grant, the veteran and much beloved missionary once of Trinidad, recently of British Columbia, was warmly welcomed as he arose to speak of his work on the Western coast.

Rev. A. E. Armstrong of Toronto, was the last speaker and the Synod gave him a good greeting as he spoke eloquently of the progress and out- look of the work in the various fields. "We don't want men who ought to be in uniform for really our first work today is to win the war." Mr. Arm- strong closed a ringing address with the words which were loudly cheered "hold the line Canada." A memor- able hour came to a close by sing- ing "Zion's King Shall Reign Victo- rious."

Rev. S. J. McArthur introduced the subject of Social Service and Evange- lism in a spirited address. The speaker reported improved conditions in every Province and ended by reading several resolutions which were warmly received.

Rev. H. R. Grant was the next speak- er. He opened by saying that the pros- pects of Prohibition in Canada are bright.

Dr. Shearer who was referred to by the Moderator as the "John Knox of Canada" was the next speaker and he succeeded in sustaining the enthus- iasm of the Synod during his ring- ing address. He also spoke in strong condemnatory terms of the Senate at Ottawa in reference to its rejection of a Bill passed by the Commons for the protection of girls and also for rejecting amendments to the Doherty Act favorable to temperance. Dr. Shearer spoke in most approving terms of the work being done by the Girls' Home in Sydney, and the Mar- time Home for Girls in Truro. Al-

**COALITION FINDS FAVOR IN RUSSIA**

**Small Uprising Which Broke Out on Saturday at Tambov Has Been Suppressed**

PETROGRAD, Oct. 5.—Confidence is increasing in government circles that the coalition idea will receive the sanction of the democratic congress. There also are indications that the plan for a preliminary parliament, ad- vocated by certain strong groups in the congress, will not meet with op- position from the government provided the property owning classes are given a fair representation.

The organizations which favor the coalition have held a conference under the presidency of M. Skobelev, former minister of labor, regarding the admission of constitutional democrats. Their participation in the parliament is approved, provided they are clear of suspicion in connection with the recent attempted revolution headed by General Korniloff.

Having declared itself in favor of a coalition government the democratic congress voted that the following amendment be made to the resolu- tion:

First.—Against inclusion in the coalition of the Bourgeois element, particularly of persons concerned in the General Korniloff revolutionary movement.

Second.—Against coalition with the entire constitutional democratic party.

**Uprising Put Down**

PETROGRAD, Oct. 5.—It was offici- ally announced today by the provi- sional government that the "revolt" which broke out on Saturday at Tam- bov, 300 miles southeast of Moscow, has been suppressed.

**Will Quit**

PETROGRAD, Oct. 5.—The demand for improved economic conditions, re- cently made by the employees of the principal Russian railways, not having been satisfied the men today announc- ed their intention of stopping work tomorrow.

**Affect Directors**

KHARKOV, Russia, Oct. 5.—Em- ployees of the Electric Light Company today arrested the directors and man- agers. After a meeting at which a proposal to deal out summary justice to the prisoners was rejected it was decided to hold them until higher wages had been granted.

**QUEBEC BOY SHOT AND KILLED ACCIDENTALLY**
