DALHOUSIE SOLDIERS GET THEIR DEGREE

HALIFAX, February 27.—Of thirty eight men in the Arts' graduating class of Dalhousie, who could obtain degrees in the spring convocation on their passing examinations, twelve, or almost one third, have either volunteered for the front, or are actually there. The twelve who are under arms in their country's cause were yesterday given their degree of B. A., at a special convocation at the university. Here are their names:—

The Munro room at the college was the scene of the convocation, where khaki uniforms were the most conspicuous feature. A number of officers were present and over their military dress. Never before in old Dalhousie was there such a spectacle. All honor to the college and the students that it was a fact yesterday.

President A. S. Mackenzie was in the chair, clad in cap and gown, and on either side were members of the faculty, some of them in uniform, and officers who soon will be at the front, with the khaki students receiving the degree. Ex-President Forest was called on to offer prayer.

Then President Mackenzie addressed the graduates in a touching and impressive speech, delivered extempore—a talk from the heart to the heart of those to whom it was specially addressed. President Mackenzie said he had no doubt the graduates who were going forward now on behalf of their country would be honorable, valorous and strong—true Dalhousians. He stated that the senate had decided that every man taking the arts' course who went to the front should be given his year without examination of further attendance at classes. This gives the degree of B. A., to twelve graduates mentioned and this year to all the other students who have joined the various contingents in Canada's expeditionary forces.
