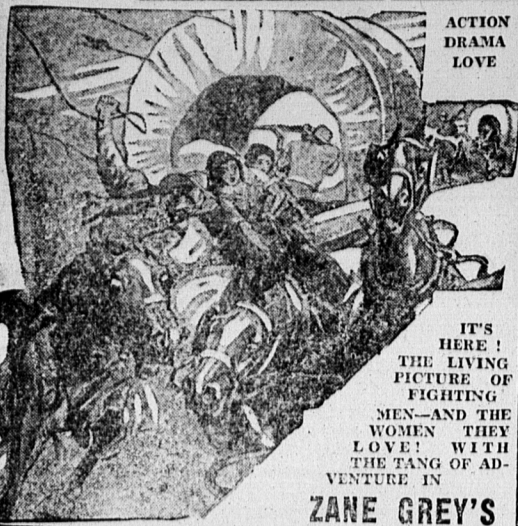

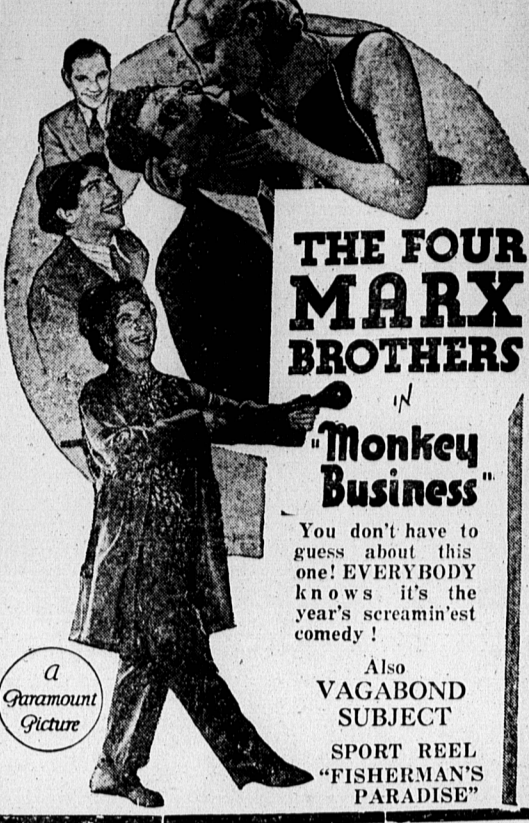

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 19.—Armament assumed a place of predominant importance in President Hoover's conversations with Foreign Minister Grandi of Italy. The two statesmen will confer at the White House today for the first of a series of talks in which they will seek to determine how their nations can best cooperate for the improvement of world conditions. Choosing his own words, the Foreign Minister described the present as "high time" to carry the world disarmament movement to a "practical result." He made this statement at a conference with newspapermen in the middle of a day devoted to diplomatic formalities and private talks with U. S. officials.

Pacific Relations Are Criticised

(Canadian Press)

NANKING, China, Nov. 18.—The opposition of certain interests to the 1931 conference of the Institute of Pacific Relations is criticised by General Chiang Kai-shek, who also scores various branches of the Koumintang in China for their obstructive attitude.

"There has been a good deal of misunderstanding in China in regard to the conference," said General Chiang. "In order to express one's views for or against certain movements, one must study and also thoroughly understand the movement first. It is folly to attack a thing before one knows what it is."

"The Institute of Pacific Relations is not a tool of any government or group of governments. The delegates are not chosen by the governments but by the people of the countries represented and I believe that the last conference was of considerable value to China. It is mere childishness to say that the Institute is imperialistic."
