IS KITCHENER MAKING TROUBLE?

Accused of Treating Native Indian Army With Contempt and Stirring Up Discontent—Times' Correspondent Has a Poor Opinion of Kitchener.

LONDON, April 20.—A 20 sensation has been created not only in military circles but in the nation by the publication in the Times of a letter from its special correspondent in India, which indicates that Lord Kitchener is handling the Indian army in a manner that will inevitably cause serious anxiety in the future. It is incidentally though unwisely a strong indication of Lord Curzon's attitude in his controversy with the late government. The correspondent, although writing anonymously, is known as an able publicist who is intimately acquainted with the politics of the empire. The gist of his accusations is that Lord Kitchener by his contemptuous treatment of the native army is creating in that body the same spirit of sullenness and discontent which was one of the main causes of the mutiny of 1857.

POOR OPINION OF KITCHENER.

After dwelling at length on the administrative steps and other measures which have led to this state of affairs he continues:

"Lord Kitchener's masterfulness grows with increasing power, and orders he so often hastily issues he as hastily with draws. He no longer shows the same industry or application to detail or the same devotion to economy which characterized his work in Egypt. He has no personal knowledge of the Indian character and his constitutional intolerance of all opposition unites him to learn from those who have had the experience he lacks."

DISREGARDS NATIVE FEELING.

In conclusion the writer touches on a matter that has been notorious in inner circles, but has hitherto not been commented upon in the press, namely that the reconquest of the Sudan was nearly wrecked in a disaster due to the same disregard for the idiosyncrasies of the

native troops which resulted in an insipient mutiny. Lord Kitchener had then already started for South Africa, but the conditions were ascribed as due directly to his policy. It is pointed out that any trouble resulting in India may in the same way be deferred until Lord Kitchener's term of office expires eighteen months hence.

Naturally this letter has produced a defence from the commander-in-chief's apologists, but those which have hitherto appeared have been too personal in tone to carry conviction. When parliament reassembles after the Easter vacation the matter will be made a subject of questions to the government.

THE LYNCHINGS AT SPRINGFIELD

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 20.—Governor Folk issued instructions to Adjutant-General Dearmond to direct General H. C. Clark, in command of the state militia, now in Springfield, to arrest the leaders of the mob of Saturday night, put them in jail, and surround the jail with troops for protection. The Governor said the militia would be kept in Springfield until quiet and order was restored and until danger of injury to persons and property was averted. He has offered a reward of \$300 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any member of the mob. The young woman who was assaulted says she is sure the negroes who were lynched were not her assailants.

PRINCE ARTHUR ON THE LINKS

OTTAWA, April 20.—Prince Arthur of Connaught, today paid an interesting visit to the Ottawa Golf Club. While there he took part in an exciting foursome, and showed considerable cleverness in handling the golf stick. In the foursome the Prince and Leveson Gower, controller of the Governor General's Household, played against Captain Wynnum and Lady Sybil Grey. After good work on both sides, the Prince's side was the winner.

After the game a pleasing little luncheon was held. There was a dinner party at Government House tonight after which the Prince attended the Russell Theatre.

GEN. BOOTH THINKS CANADA OUGHT TO SPEND MILLIONS.

MONTREAL, April 20.—A special London cable says: Interviewed at Aberdeen, General Booth today told of the efforts of the Salvation Army in colonizing Canada and declared that it would be a good investment for the government to spend a few millions for that purpose. He said that it would not be very much for the government to spend £10,000,000 per annum making out of the unemployed people, agricultural laborers, or estians and unskilled laborers who were walking the streets or living on the verge of starvation, good and prosperous people who would fight for their flag if it were necessary.

MONTREAL, April 20.—It has been stated that Maxim Gorky, the leader of the Russian social Revolutionists, might visit Montreal and lecture in this city during his visit to America. Although the local "Red" colony would like nothing better than the privilege of welcoming the famous Russian novelist, their chances of meeting him here are considered very slim. Gorky is almost worshipped by the Russian exiles in the United States and Canada. He is their hero on account of his adventurous career. A local socialist when asked whether he thought there was any truth in the rumor that Gorky was coming here replied, "emphatically in the negative."
