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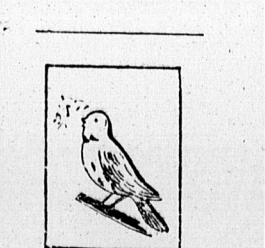
Study Eradication Of Insect Pests

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

BELLEVILLE, Ont., Nov. 20 — With sessions open to the public, the 73rd annual meeting of the entomological society of Ontario opened here at the Dominion parasite laboratory, about 60 delegates present, including experts from the United States and Canada.

The grasshopper outbreak in Ontario this year was discussed by H. A. Gilbert of Ottawa and R. W. Thompson of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, while the corn borer, one of the greatest pests in this section of the province, was discussed by L. Caesar, Guelph.

The subjects up for discussion were highly technical. A. B. Baird, in charge of the parasite laboratory in this city, said a great deal of work was being done by the society to eradicate insect pests. The sweet clover boll weevil was said to have been nearly eliminated.
