The Grattan horse has taken on a lot of mahogany new heat of life and may be very dangerous in his class.

Richard Armstrong has Miss Admiral Mac 2:14 and Skippydale 2:12 under his name. Aymar Worth 2:15 1/2, who received his early training from Art McManis of this city, will be out again this year racing for Lee Jones. Henry Hayes will have June Sympson for the pacing classes and expects to give her a low record before the season ends. George Kane, owner of the track, is training Jean Volo, a nice gaited and good mannered pacer.

King's County Needs Stressed By Liberal Electors Of Montague

A meeting of the Liberal electors of Montague, East and West polls was held Thursday evening for the purpose of passing resolutions, making appointments and appointing delegates to attend a federal convention in Georgetown. The meeting was very largely attended and was addressed by Mr. S.S. Hessian, K.C., who outlined the needs of King's County.

Mr. Hessian stated the County was the most neglected one, so far as expenditure of federal money was concerned, in Eastern Canada. He read part of the speech delivered by Hon. Mr. Cullen, Speaker of the Legislature, wherein he referred to the same matter in the recent Budget debate, also to the speech of Hon. Dr. MacMillan, leader of the Opposition. Mr. Hessian concurred in the latter's statement that Georgetown should have been utilized for war purposes, being the best harbour in Eastern Canada, and thanked Dr. MacMillan for bringing this matter before the Legislature.

A committee consisting of Dr. Fred S. Macdonald, Souris, Crilly Lea, Murray Harbour, and S. M. Laburge, was appointed for the purpose of drawing up a resolution urging the Dominion Government to place one of the breakers now in the St. Lawrence River on the route between Georgetown and Pictou next winter in case anything should happen to the ferry at Borden. Also to build storage houses, properly heated, at Lowville, Montague and Murray.

The regular monthly meeting of the Charlottetown Branch Canadian Legion was held Thursday night with a large number of members present. Three applications for membership were read and the applicants granted membership in the branch. The reports of the various committees were read and adopted and showed that the activities of the branch were being carried on in an excellent manner.
