SACKVILLE, N.B., May 21 - (CP) - "We British people fight for a way of living, for freedom, and we would rather be deprived of life itself than that these rights, this way of living, should pass from our grasp," declared C. Albert Oulton, supervisor of schools, Sackville, Sask., speaking at the annual banquet of the Mount Allison Federated Alumni.

"Education is the ultimate guarantee of civil liberty," said Mr. Oulton. "Never in our history has there been such a need for educated citizens with vision."
