NEVILLE GLADSTONE IN CANADA.

Henry Neville Gladstone, third son of the great English Premier and Chancellor has lately been in Canada, making a first visit to this country. The immediate object of his trip was to inspect the Cape Breton coal fields in which he is financially interested. He afterwards passed through the country to Vancouver and on his return to Montreal was interviewed by The Witness. He expressed himself as "perfectly astonished" at the extent and productiveness of the coal and iron of Cape Breton. His impression of Canada is that it is going ahead by leaps and bounds.

Travelling across the continent, he remarked, the extraordinary difference in conditions in the various provinces. "Nova Scotia," he said, "is absolutely different to Quebec; Quebec absolutely different to Ontario. Ontario is absolutely different to the great prairie country, and that in its turn is absolutely different to British Columbia. The difference is so marked as to make it seem like passing from one country to another. But everywhere I was immensely struck, with the activity of the people, and by the extraordinary prospects. It is quite evident that you have some very big brains connected with the development of the country, not only in the railways, but in the commerce and industry."

Mr. Gladstone was pleased to learn of the influx of American settlers and capital to Canada, and thinks that it is a mistake to shut out the Sikhs who want to come from India. They are a stalwart, intelligent martial people and make excellent quiet workers, and Canada everywhere needs more willing workers. Asked what he would say when his friends asked him about the Dominion, he replied, "I shall have no hesitation when I get home," he replied, "in recommending all my friends to come out here and invest their money, for there are great opportunities and the general conditions are thoroughly sound."

Henri Bourassa M. P. who is leading the independents in Quebec, and who helped to defeat the Laurier candidate in Quebec County the other day, comes of revolutionary stock. He is a grandson of the great Louis Joseph Papineau who led the rebellion in Lower Canada in 1837.

Monoton has a prisoner known as Jack Josiah, who is forty-seven years old, and according to his own statement has spent twenty-six years in prison. He turned the first sod for the foundation of the Monoton lockup and was the first prisoner to be detained in the completed building. His besetting vice is drink. The prison and the whiskey saloon are everywhere associated. It is better to send the drunkard maker to jail than to send the poor drunkard thither.

On Tuesday November 6 the great contest between Hughes and Hearst for the Governorship of New York will be decided at the polls. A large majority of the leading newspapers are in favor of Hughes, or at least against Hearst, and this renders it difficult to form a fair estimate of the chances. The betting is still with large, but decreasing odds in favor of Hughes. New York State now has a population of about eight millions. More votes will be polled than in a general election throughout Canada. The salary of Governor in New York is \$10,000 a year and the official term is two years.

The early and severe snowstorm that swept over northwestern Ontario caught the myriads of migrating birds in the night with pathetically disastrous results. Lake Huron was strewn with thousands of the victims. Robins, sparrow hawks and white throats, confused and chilled by the darkness, storm and cold, fell into the troubled waves and perished.

Russia has given orders for the construction of a battleship of the Dreadnaught type and other naval powers are expected to follow the example. Lord Tweedmouth, First Lord of the Admiralty, pointed out in a recent speech "that Britain's naval strength at the present moment is greater than that of any combination that could be brought against her."

HOW TO HAVE PURE ELECTIONS.

In the wide-spread prevalence of electoral corruption some worthy persons have almost despaired of ever seeing honest and clean elections in Canada. That is not a right attitude nor one necessary to be taken. What seems necessary to be done is first of all, to educate the public mind as it has been educated, for instance, on the temperance question. Make it apparent to all as it now is to the many that the men who buy or sell votes are the enemies of the state and a source of public danger, as great as the incendiary with his torch. An enlightened public opinion and an awakened public conscience on this question will make it as disgraceful to buy or sell votes as it is now to steal.

With an awakened public conscience will come amendments to the election laws, such as will punish both the briber and the bribed with imprisonment and disfranchisement, and will send to the penitentiary the election official who betrays his trust. Politicians, of all men, like to enjoy public favor, and once they find that political corruption is in disrepute they will follow honest methods. They will have the further inducement that pure elections are the cheapest, and the chances of success quite as favorable as when both parties are expending money and whiskey. The amended laws will also make it easier to bring to speedy justice the candidate or the agent who sins against electoral purity.

The educational campaign necessary to prepare the way for pure elections should not be left till the election is upon us. The election fever dulls the conscience and blunts the moral sensibilities of men. The work of education must be done between elections. One thousand men honestly determined to do their best to frown down and punish electoral corruption could practically sweep it out of our fair island. One hundred men, with like purpose and well organized could accomplish wonders. We hope that before the next election comes round there may be such an organization formed as may make an effective educational campaign for pure elections, and for the punishment of all who violate the election laws. It is greatly needed; it would accomplish untold good.

Mr. Macdon, the new provisional Governor of Cuba, found twelve million dollars, mostly in gold, in the Cuban treasury. This unexpected find has gone far to restore the good name of ex-President Palma, against whom wholesale charges of looting the treasury for corrupt purposes had been made.

Sir James Grant is quoted as saying that 8,000 persons die of consumption yearly in Canada and these mostly in youth or the prime of life. At the low valuation of \$1,000 each the direct money loss to the country is \$8,000,000 a year. Half as much more goes to pay the doctors' bills and nursing, to say nothing of the grief and heartbreak over these live-out-offs. Canada could well afford to spend some millions yearly in preventive measures against the white plague.

The Halifax Herald appears by its issue of Saturday to have dropped out of the Queen's Shelburne campaign. We fail to find any mention of Dr. Weidon or of his meetings in the entire 16 pages of its issue. The Herald's readers are left to guess the reason for this extraordinary course taken so near to polling day. The Chronicle on the other hand is campaigning vigorously for Mr. Fielding, declares the "Weidonites are on the run," and points out that the Opposition candidate refuses to hold any more joint meetings with Mr. Fielding or his lieutenants.

The dismissal of fifty-seven conductors by the Grand Trunk Railway management affords a strong commentary upon the prevalent dishonesty and untrustworthiness of many persons in these days who hold positions of trust and responsibility. The detectives employed found evidence of wrong doing against these men. They also found that one conductor was worth \$10,000 and another was the reputed owner of six grocery stores.

A casual reading of the St. John newspapers, several of which are out of sight beyond each other in circulation, reveals constant trouble in that loyal city. Almost every day the water mains burst and the people on the higher levels must needs go down town to wash themselves. The ferry boats arouse sarcastic remarks. Sand Point berths arouse prolonged disputes as to the depth of water. Dredging is affirmed to be an urgent necessity, but there is no dredge. The street railway, the price of gas, the City Council and the long projected dry dock are other topics of more or less excited and critical interest from day to day. There is so much turmoil over the civic housekeeping in St. John that an outsider wonders how other serious business can be carried on.
