Cordial Welcome Tendered Visiting Secretary Of Chamber Of Commerce At Prince Co. Capital. Mr. Clark's Address Enthusiastically Received By Trade Board.

At a delightful informal supper meeting in the Clifton Hotel, Summerside, about twenty-five members of the Board of Trade of that city had the pleasure of being introduced to Mr. W. McL. Clark, Secretary of Canadian Chamber of Commerce, who is on a short visit to the Island with his family. Mr. Clark's cheerful and optimistic remarks on trade conditions in Canada and the growth of her industries brought a feeling of assurance to the Summerside Board of Trade that depression was on the down grade and a good future was in store for Canada.

NO WORK, NO RELIEF SAYS TORONTO

Men Must Work Out The Amount At the Rate of \$4.00 Per Day.

WINDSOR, Ont., July 9.—No work, no relief, is the slogan adopted by the city of Windsor in treatment of "unemployed" who have been receiving assistance from the City. According to the plan, which will go into effect on Monday next, there will not be any change in the allowances made to families or to single men, but instead of just receiving the grocery or other orders, the men must now work out the amount at the rate of \$4.00 per day.

SOUTH AFRICA AFTER TRADE AGREEMENT

Negotiations Opened With Canada, which If Reached Will Have Vital Effect On U.S. Fruit Trade.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, July 9.—South Africa has opened negotiations for a trade agreement with Canada, which if reached will have a vital effect on the American fruit trade. Last year the Union of South Africa imported \$12,000,000 in Canadian goods and exported only \$2,000,000 worth to Canada. It is hoped to adjust this balance by inducing Canada to grant special facilities for South Africa citrus fruits, jams and preserves. An agreement with Japan is an obstacle, as since it was passed the Japanese have been outwitting the Canadian shoe trade.

FARMERS' INSTITUTE IN SESSION

Resolutions Passed Re Supervisor For Institute, and "Side Hitch"—Much Discussion On President's Report.

A resolution requesting the Government to appoint a supervisor for the Central Farmers Institute to assist in promoting the work of the organization among the farmers was passed at the annual meeting of the Institute held at Prince of Wales College yesterday. A resolution advocated by the Dunk River Farmers Institute was passed to be brought before the Government. The resolution suggested the adoption of the "side hitch" by the single team, with a view of bettering winter roads in the Province and eliminating pitches. The latter resolution passed with two dissenting votes.

At a meeting of directors following the convention, Mr. J. E. Dingwell, who had presided, was re-elected president, Mr. Peter Brodie was elected vice-president, and Mr. C. E. McKenzie, secretary and treasurer.

The President, Mr. J. E. Dingwell then read his annual report which gave a comprehensive review of the year's activities and of agricultural conditions.

In opening Mr. Dingwell commented on the changed time of the meeting which was held in the summer season rather than during Farmers' Week.

B. I. SOCIETY RECEPTION FOR BISHOP

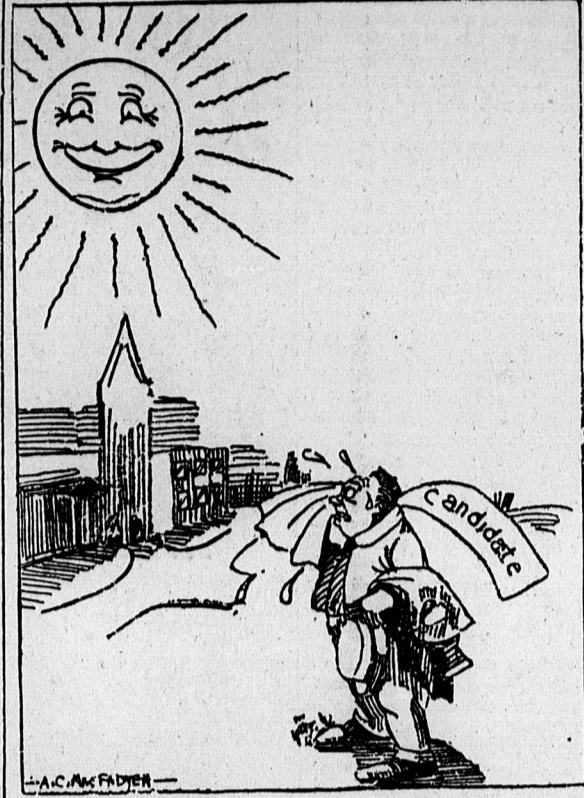

TARIFF BOARD PROROGATION BILL GOES NEXT WEEK TO THE SENATE IS SUGGESTED

Approval of Third Reading Marks Conclusion of One of the Most Stubborn Battles in Commons During Session.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 9.—The Government bill creating a tariff board now goes to the Senate. Today the House of Commons, by a majority of 34 votes, defeated an amendment offered to the motion for third reading by Right Hon. Mackenzie King and also negated a proposal of Hon. Ernest Lapointe, former Minister of Justice, to give the bill the six months' hoist. Third reading was given without a registered vote, the opposition merely demanding that the bill be recorded as being passed "on division."

Approval of the third reading for the tariff board bill marks the conclusion of one of the most stubborn battles which has taken place in the Commons during the present session. Headed by Mr. King, opposition members fought certain features of the bill from first to last. Strongest exception was taken to the section which provided a ten year term of office for members of the board. This section remains unchanged.

Ordered To Stop Work On Railway

OTTAWA, Ont., July 9.—Instructions have been issued to the contractors on the partly constructed railroad from Sunny Brae to Guysborough, N. S., to cease work and remove their equipment, Honorable B. J. Manion, Minister of Railways, informed William Duff, (Liberal) Antigonish-Guysborough) in the House of Commons today.

Bonds were issued to provide for the building of the road, together with other capital expenditures, occurring during 1930 and 1931, but they were not sufficient to complete it. The act authorizing the construction of the line provided for the expenditure of \$3,500,000 plus 15 percent, or a total of \$4,025,000, but the act did not at the same time provide the money.

THE FOX BREEDERS' AT S' SIDE

Annual Meeting of Canadian Association Continues—Passing of Amendments.

The most important matter that came up on Thursday at the Fox Breeders' meeting in the Agricultural Hall, was a motion put by Mr. P. G. Clark and seconded by Mr. Brown of Kensington, that the amendments being passed at this meeting dealing with applications, registrations and fees be made retroactive. This was the outcome of a strong plea by Mr. W. K. Rogers, of Charlottetown, that it was at the present time that the rancher needed assistance and that if these amendments were going to help the rancher they had to become effective at once. Mr. Kennedy, of Charlottetown, fully endorsed the opinions of Mr. Rogers and others. A member from Salisbury, N. B., was also in accord with this motion, as he said, in the next twenty years the fur situation may never be just so critical as it is today.

Another important matter was a resolution passed by a standing vote that those who had not yet made application for the marking of their puppies, that the time would be extended to August 10th at a fee of \$1 for the year 1931 only, providing that it is passed by the Minister of Agriculture. The previous motion would also be subject to the same authority.

Mr. P. G. Clark made the important statement that heavy leather and under fur is of far greater importance today than the silky ness of the fur and he considered that inspectors should pay more attention to what a female can produce in the way of pups with good leather and under fur than whether she comes up to the standard in top fur.

The meeting opened shortly after 10 a. m. with a fair attendance of fox breeders. The time was taken up with the discussion of the directors proposed amendments and opened with discussion on the last paragraph of article 19 which on motion of Mr. B. W. Robinson was laid over.

LIQUOR SALES SHOW DECLINE OF \$500,000

Decrease Also In Arrests For Drunkenness of Nearly 50 Percent.

FREDERICTON, July 9.—The following statement has been issued today officially by R. G. Fulton, Chairman of the New Brunswick Liquor Control Board.

The sales of the New Brunswick Liquor Control Board show a falling off of over \$500,000 for the corresponding period of the previous year. This is accounted for not only by the present depression but by the strict supervision of sales by the various managers throughout the Province. Some months ago the Chief Commissioner of the Board instructed all the branch managers to refuse sales where their judgment indicated such action.

There is also a marked decrease in arrests for intoxication. The city police, Saint John and Moncton, the two largest centres of the Province, are co-operating splendidly with the provincial officers, and the result is a marked improvement in conditions. Arrests for intoxication are down nearly fifty percent in these two cities.

Women Of The Province In Annual Session

Opening Meetings Of Institute Convention Held Yesterday In P. W. C. Hall. Reports Presented On Branches Of Work.

The first session of the eighteenth annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Women's Institutes opened in the Prince of Wales College Hall on Thursday at 10 a. m. The morning session was devoted to the registration of delegates numbering 350. At 12 a. m. the delegates were taken in cars to the Experimental Farm where a delicious luncheon was served. In connection with the Women's Institutes, the farmers also held their picnic at the farm, at which short addresses were given by W. R. Shaw of the Department of Agriculture, Dr. J. A. Clark, Superintendent of the Experimental Farm, Mr. James Dingwell of the Farmer's Institutes and Mrs. William Mutch, President of the Women's Institutes.

The afternoon session opened at 2 p. m. with the President, Mrs. William Mutch in the chair by the singing of "It's a Good Time to Get Acquainted," and repeating the creed in unison. In the absence of Premier Lea, Mr. W. R. Shaw gave the address of welcome on behalf of the Province. He commended the Institutes particularly in the good work along the lines of education, child welfare and public health. The building of the sanatorium was largely due to the initiative of the Women's Institutes. He stressed the need of continuing this program in order to preserve the physical and moral health of the youth of P. E. I.

Along the lines of agriculture he advised the promotion of boys and girls, clubs, among the boys to further their interests in the growing of better live stock and the girls in farm home-makers clubs.

Miss Fielding of Alberton, graciously replied. The minutes of the 1930 convention were read by the Secretary Miss Lulu Yeo.

Mr. H. J. Montgomery, Provincial President of Alberta, brought greetings from Alberta to our Institutes.

ELIMINATION OF LEVEL CROSSINGS

Will Occupy Important Place In Ontario's Unemployment Relief Program This Fall And Winter.

(Special to the Guardian)

OTTAWA, Ont., July 9.—The elimination of level crossings will occupy an important place in Ontario's unemployment relief program this fall and winter. Mr. Henry favors that type of relief work, because it removes a menace to public life and safety and can be made to provide employment for a large number of men, and constitutes a smaller burden on the municipality than most types of relief work. The introduction of such a program is contingent upon the grade crossing fund being supplemented and some assistance given the railways in bearing the heavy financial burden, which they must under current arrangements assume in the elimination of level crossings.

Premier Henry instanced a crossing elimination at Trenton, costing approximately \$120,000 which the grade crossing fund supplied \$48,000. The county assumed \$36,000 and the municipality was only called upon to pay 20 per cent of that, or only \$7,200. He did not think there would be difficulty in finding public works which should be proceeded with and which could be made to provide considerable work for the unemployed. "A large part of the works proposed last fall and winter were never approved or started. They would be available for this fall and winter" he said. So far as the organization of battalions of unemployed transients or drifters is concerned, Premier Henry said that the suggestion had been made to him that this would be one way of solving that problem, but he indicated that nothing has been done yet to put the idea into effect.
