

Saints Hang Shutout On Summerside Team

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Win 15-0 Victory In Opening Game Of Semi-final Series

Staving off their opponents' terrific bid in the first sixteen minutes of the game, minutes that saw the **joers** miss at least four goals by erratic shooting, and coming in to score two goals in the last three minutes of the period to take a 2-0 lead Jackie Kane's powerful S.D.U. hockey squad last night ran wild in the two closing periods to smother Summerside All-Stars under a 15-0 count in the first game of a scheduled best of three semi-final series leading to the City Hockey League finals.

Appearing as if they were going to give the Saints their toughest battle of the season the collapse of the Summerside team in the last two sessions amazed the large crowd present, and from the halfway mark of the middle canto there was little doubt of the outcome.

Shorn of the services of their brilliant goalie Bobby Schurman who suffered a deep gash over the right eye when clipped by a stick in a second period goal scramble the Summerside team seemed to disintegrate. Loaman, goalie for the Legion team in the Summerside League came in to replace the injured net guardian; two minutes after he took up his position he suffered a cut on the mouth in another mad scramble but returned to the fray. But he could not halt the avalanche of rubber the free-wheeling S.D.U. forwards fired at him, although he did hold them to two goals for the balance of the middle session.

Saints in their lop-sided victory picked up 31 scoring points with their punch line of McDonald, Mahar and McIsaac accounting for seventeen of them, eight of them on goals with Joe Manar getting four, and McDonald and McIsaac two apiece. Reg Rodgers speedily forward had three counters to his credit with McAdam and Ledwell getting a brace of goals apiece.

A spectacle the game failed to live up to expectations after the Saints driving attacks started to punch through. Robbed of goals by their own erratic shooting or through the brilliance of Shorty McKinnon in the nets who richly deserved his shutout the visitors after a great start in which they checked like leeches saw McIsaac and Mahar punch holes in Schurman's armour twice in 28 seconds to leave the ice with a two goal lead.

Before the four minute mark of the second period had been reached Saints had run their lead to 4-0 on goals from the sticks of Rodgers and Mahar but still there was little indication of the slaughter that was to come as Summerside themselves had again snuffed on a couple of good chances. Saints were pressing continually and suddenly Schurman fell to the ice as a stick caught him over the eye. He was unable to return to the game after receiving medical attention and Loaman came in to replace him. From the faceoff at the side of the net Saints got possession and

slapped in goal number five, Mahar being the marksman and before the period had ended they made it an even half dozen as McDonald scored on an unassisted effort.

But the avalanche was in full swing throughout the third and final period. With all three lines punching through for close-up attempts the Summerside goalie was the hardest worked man on the ice. 1:20 from the start McDonald on a pass from Mahar made it 7-0 and before the six minute mark had been reached Saints ran their count into double figures, A. J. McAdam getting two in a row in less than a minute and then passing to Rodgers for goal number ten just past the half way mark.

Pulling no punches Saints continued to set a furious pace and before the scoring bee had ended McIsaac, Ledwell, Rodgers, Ledwell again and Mahar fired the rubber into the cage on fast breaking attacks.

Summerside fighting it out to the last play tried hard to break McKinnon's shutout. Vince Grant went right in to the goalie's doorstep but McKinnon outguessed him. It was the last open chance the visitors had as the Saints gave their young goalie every protection by close checking to keep him in his shutout victory. Just where it will all wind up is problematical with the exception of team backers—they are certain of winding up in the red—and it now looks as if something will have to be done and soon if the league is ever going to flourish as it should.

Saints basketball team snapped out of their losing streak in the City Basketball League with a vengeance Wednesday night with the Navy crew falling victims to their sudden return to form. Saints' performance was pleasing to their followers after a couple of disappointing appearances that very nearly had them mired at the bottom of the standings.

Now that the University crew have regained their winning ways they should be plenty tough to knock off from here in. Boasting fast and smart ball handlers the hoopsters can also travel at a fast clip from the opening whistle to the final one. They have paid off in other years on their speed and it is likely that now they have settled down again opposing teams will find the S.D.U. team throwing more and more speed at them in an effort to take a firm grip on first place in the standings.
