"Unity is Strength. In the hearts and minds of the delegates who assembled in this room on September 1st, 1864, was born the Dominion of Canada."
"Precedence being their guide they builded better than they knew."
"This tablet is erected on the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of the event."

Of more than special interest on the Island's ever-increasing number of summer visitors. The Chamber contains a mural bronze placed there in 1914 by the Dominion of Canada in commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the conference. There are also a number of interesting documents and other records dealing with the Confederation period, together with portraits by Harris of several of the Confederation Fathers. The tables, chairs, and other furniture have been in use since the building was completed in 1875. The visitors' book contains the signature of Sir John A. MacDonaid, who gave his occupation as that of "Cabinet-maker." The Chamber is now used for meetings of the Provincial Executive Council and for other public purposes.

CLOSING YESTERDAY OF CITY SCHOOLS

Exercises Held At West Kent, Queen Square, Rochford Square And Model Schools. Lists Of Winners Of Prizes And Certificates.

The West Kent, Queen Square and Rochford Square Schools closed yesterday forenoon for the mid-summer vacation.

At West Kent School, Messrs. Simon Paoli and Reuben Macdonald were the joint chairmen; at Queen Square, Hon. Dr. MacMillan, and Rochford Square, Hon. H. J. MacPhee presided.

There was a large attendance of parents and other visitors.

WEST KENT SCHOOL CLOSING
At the closing of West Kent School today, Principal Johnson, in his report of the year's work, stated that the attendance was the largest in the history of the schools, 420 boys and 138 girls. He then reviewed the work of the school in its various phases throughout the year.

The musical program was greatly enjoyed and was very creditable to the pupils and to their instructor, in singing, Prof. L. D. Thompson.

Mrs. Wilkins, on behalf of the I. O. D. E. made an announcement regarding the League of Nations examinations and stated that a similar competition will be conducted next fall. In the last contest held the West Kent School made the highest average of marks.

The chairman, Mr. Paoli, in the course of his address, stated that he was an old pupil of the school, having attended there fifty years ago, two years after the cornerstone was laid by the late Thomas Heath Haviland, and the late Sir Louis Davies.

He commended the teachers and the pupils on the excellent manner in which the program was renewed. He referred to the many former pupils of the school who had won distinction in different parts of the world and also commended the high standard of education and of morality for which Prince Edward Island was famed.

He gave valuable advice to the pupils, stating that it is not always the brilliant pupil who achieves success in later life, but the boy or girl who is plodding and persevering.

The programme was published in yesterday's Guardian.

QUEEN SQUARE SCHOOL
The closing exercises of Queen Square School were held with Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Chairman. During the course of the morning, the pupils were addressed by Mrs. P. S. Wilkins, who explained the procedure regarding the League of Nations Examinations to be held next fall. Mrs. W. J. MacInnis also addressed the pupils. Remarks were made by Right Rev. Monsignor Maurice McDonald, Rev. B. Gillis, D.D., and Mr. L. B. Miller, Chairman of the City School Board.

The chairman, Hon. Dr. MacMillan explained the advisability of cutting the ten year curriculum down to nine and voiced the hope that the parents, teachers and students would co-operate to the full extent with the School Board on all matters helpful to and aiding in the advancement of education. He complimented the pupils and teachers on the fine standard set and adhered to during the term just closed.
