LIBERAL TRIBUTE TO SIR CHARLES.

So far there has been less asperity during the present political campaign than during many campaigns in the past. Notably there have been fair tributes to the leaders from writers and speakers politically opposed to them. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been well spoken of on several public occasions by Opposition speakers and also in several Conservative journals. We now have much pleasure in reproducing the words of Attorney General Longley, in a speech recently made at Oxford, N. S. in which he made kindly reference to the Conservative leader, in terms not unlike those used by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the House of Commons on the occasion of the 45th anniversary of Sir Charles Tupper's entry into public life. At that time we published the Liberal leader's fair-minded and generous tribute. Mr. Longley has during his entire life been opposed, and at times very bitterly opposed to Sir Charles Tupper. At Oxford he said: "I have no harsh or unpleasant word to say in relation to Sir Charles Tupper, the leader of the Conservative party, or his able lieutenant, Mr. George E. Foster, nor indeed for my old opponent, Mr. C. H. Cahoon, who is the Conservative standard bearer in this county. I have no doubt that all of these men whom I have named are according to their own best judgment, desirous of furthering the best interests of Canada. For the veteran leader, Sir Charles Tupper, with whom I have been in political antagonism since the first moment in which I became capable of having an opinion on political matters and with whom, I regret to say, it is now impossible for me to agree, I would like to pay a passing tribute for the eminent position which he has been able to achieve during forty five years of active participation in political affairs. Most of us cannot concur in his views, and some things he has done in the earlier part of his life which some of us still view with bitterness and resentment, but it is now impossible to ignore the fact that he has achieved a great position, and, now approaching eighty years of age, exhibits wonderful vitality and vigor in supporting the cause, which he doubtless believes wise and patriotic." This tribute is alike creditable to the speaker and to the subject of his generous eulogy.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier opens his Ontario tour with a meeting at Massey Hall, Toronto, on the 18th, at which Hon. Messrs. Cartwright, Fielding, Mulock, Patterson and Sutherland will be present. After the meeting the Ministers will divide into groups, Sir Wilfrid, Sir Richard and Hon. David Mills touring through Western Ontario for a time. The Premier will visit Eastern Ontario at a later date. Mr. Fielding will remain for some days in the west before returning to Nova Scotia.

Among the finds at Pretoria was a plaster cast of Kruger, inscribed "President van Kaap Colonial" (President of Cape Colony) and a map of the Cape country divided into republican districts as the Boers hoped to see it. Another map was found in the post office at C. L. S.burg, covering the British Provinces and the Dutch Republics, the whole inscribed "Vereinigd Zuid Africa" (United South Africa). The vision of a United South Africa will now be realized, but it will be all under the British flag, and Kruger will not be its President.

The Montreal Witness does not credit the rumors of an early dissolution of the Quebec Legislature with the object of bringing the provincial and federal elections near together. The Witness also notes much political apathy in both Ontario and Quebec, notwithstanding the campaigning and largely attended meetings of the leaders of both parties. So far the list of candidates nominated runs up to only about one half of the full quota, but many conventions will meet in the near future, and it is taken for granted that most of the members of the late House will again go to the polls as candidates.

The account of the Yukon Territory since its opening up to date show an expenditure of \$3,285,765 and a revenue of \$3,800,930 leaving a balance of \$515,165 of net revenue.

From Grand Forks, North Dakota comes a report that within the next few weeks between 200 and 300 Boers will arrive to settle there and that 2,000 more will follow, from the Transvaal. It is said they have been reduced to poverty by the war, and cannot consent to remain under British rule.

The C. P. R. statement for six months shows the gross earnings in that time were \$14,167,797, and the working expenses \$8,879,857, leaving net earnings of \$5,277,940. At its present price of about 87, C. P. R. stock pays 5.74 per cent. It would be a fine thing if the Intercolonial like the C. P. R. could pay working expenses with the interest on its cost and a goodly surplus besides.

One of the most touching addresses ever made by a public man to his constituents was that sent by the late Premier Marchand from his death-bed to the electors of Iberville. He was not again soliciting their votes, but returning thanks for their past support during thirty-three years that they had continuously elected him, and at the same time taking leave of them for ever. Under conditions of such solemnity he was able to use the language of one who had fought a good fight and finished his political course with honor. Among other things he said:

"I have ever striven to fulfil the mandate I held from you with scrupulous fidelity, for I have never understood that a promise given to an assemblage was less binding on honor and conscience than an engagement undertaken toward an individual."

It will be seen that the City Council has endorsed the movement to erect a monument to our brave boys who have fallen in battle. They will invite subscriptions to that end and have resolved to vote a sum not yet specified from the city treasury. They also ask the Provincial Government to take action in the matter as will no doubt be done. All of which ought to give such an impetus to the movement as to secure the Memorial.
