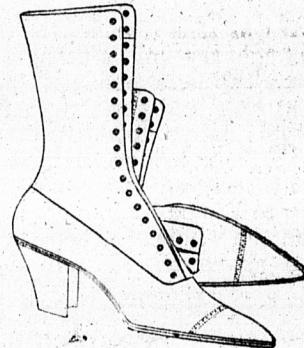
ALL THE WORLD A-WHEEL

"All the world a-wheel" was the prophecy when the solid-tired, safety bicycle first appeared sometime round half a century ago and made its grandfather of the 60 inch old "boneshaker" look like an old nag against a thoroughbred. When the first cousin to the solid tire, the cushion, came on the scene a little later the prophecy looked more like a winner, but with the advent of the pneumatic tire it became a certainty. The pneumatic tire made the bicycle the friend of man it is today. With it vanished the pains after a bumpety-dump 10 mile spin. In these latter days of the evolution of the bicycle cycling was regarded chiefly as a pastime. But the succeeding years brought better machines and now in these days when the call is for speeding up the bicycle is one of the most valued assets of the dust-grimed toiler and the business man alike. The early morning worker uses his wheel to his work and escapes the rush-hour crowds on the cars by cycling home. The clerk who prefers the fresh air goes to his office on his wheel and the schoolboy and girl pedal to their "crams." In business, commercial and professional circles the modern bicycle has also in recent years proved an essential. The grocer, butcher, fishmonger and chemist has overcome the difficulty provided by the slow-footed messenger by using the cycle for rush orders by phone realizing that prompt service means more custom. The milkman who delivers his milk during the dark hours returns at a more Christian-like time for his dues and in these same days when the credit system has established itself the collector makes headway on his cycle. The same with the person who collects the rent. Columns might be filled describing the commercial uses to which the bicycle is put today. And employers of labor encourage the man or woman who cycles to work. In all the big munition plants and airplane factories racks have been provided for hundreds of wheels and it is the same to a lesser extent in smaller factories.

Apart from the labor and time-saving the bicycle affords there is the equally important question of health. To pleasant cycling exercise along shady country roads and visits at leisure to the beauty spots in their own not far-distant surroundings hundreds of thousands of people of
