that is the fiscal question, was a subject taboed by the chairman of the conference, Hon. James Murdoch, who was more engrossed in more personal affairs at the time.

Claims Credit for Tories.

"Futility follows futility," said Mr. Meighen, "while the country suffers as a consequence." The Government, said Mr. Meighen, had taken away the protection on which national industry depended and offered nothing in return. Canada needed not "an expensive Shibboleth" or any new business nostrum, but it needed only to get back on to the "rock of common sense of the National policy" and to profit by the experience and tradition of 50 years of prosperity, he said.

Constructive politics in Canada, said the Conservative leader, had always had their genesis in the Conservative party. Whatever there was of solid and dependable policy in the Liberal administrations had been a heritage from Conservatives. "True," said Mr. Meighen, "there were some great Liberal enterprises which were constructive while they were under construction." There was the Transcontinental Railway. But these, he said, had come back as liabilities to the doorsteps of Canadians, who were the mortgagees for these enterprises, which had become a monument to the folly of 20 years ago.

amst the Government's failure to carry out its "sack the lot" policy against former British sympathizers who are in administrative posts Extremism has developed among the Free State supporters who demand a complete cut with the older influences whom they suspect of no change of heart towards British control and whom they regard as merely acquiescing in the present state of affairs, which they were unable to prevent.

The National group expresses the discontent of the army officers whose ultimatum demanding a forward movement recently created a serious crisis. These latter form a strong militant section which holds that the Anglo-Irish treaty under which the present Government was established must be utilized as a stepping stone to complete independence free of all Imperial associations and control. They boldly urged that the Government has failed to carry out the ideas of Collins and Griffith, has submitted to influences favorable to the British and restrained its policy to hold the friendship and secure the co-operation of the section of southern opinion which believes in this tendency.

Northern Boundary Menace. Over this internal situation hangs the menace of the Northern Boundary. It is generally expected the majority findings of the Boundary Commission will deny the Free State's claim to large portions of Northern territory and that this will bring disastrous results for Cosgrave's prestige and for that of his Government which has pledged the South to accept the findings whatever they are. Prompt popular repudiation is expected when the findings are published and the converging troubles are likely to overwhelm the Ministry. In the remote contingency of the Commission's findings satisfying the aspirations of the Free State, the Northerners will decline to yield. This confronted with trouble either way the Government is preparing the public mind for disappointment by preaching the doctrine of "tolerated secession" on the part of the Northerners.

No member of the Government says that the present measure of freedom is final, but all prefer avoiding making public pledges of the

Yesterday's Market Report

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Nov. 19.—Demand from local buyers for cash grain in the domestic market today was somewhat limited and the volume of business was small. The car lot trade was also quiet and prices were unchanged with Ontario No. 3 extra malting barley quoted at \$1.09, No. 3 grade at \$1.08 per bushel ex track Ontario No. 2, white oats at 62, No. 3 grade at 60, etc., and No. 4 grade at 58 cents per bushel ex store. Prices on all grades of winter wheat flour were well maintained under a steady demand for supplies. The tone of winter wheat flour was firm at the recent advances noted. A fairly active business was transacted in eggs and the tone of the market very firm with no change in prices to note. The market for potatoes was with out any new feature to note. Little business was transacted in cheese because there was no improvement in the demand from foreign buyers although the trend was steady. Extreme dullness marked the butter trade.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Nov. 19.—(Eggs)—The undertone is firm on account of the scarcity of fresh receipts. At number of producing points storage eggs are being brought in as there are not enough fresh coming to meet the local demand. Storage eggs continue to move into consumption freely. Slightly castler undertone. Storage extras 47 to 48 firsts 43 to 44 seconds 37 to 38. Montreal egg receipts light, fresh extras scarce; prices firm, unchanged. Ottawa retailing fresh extras 65, storage extras 58, firsts 47 to 52. Winnipeg firm, retailing extras 55 to 60, firsts 50 to 55, seconds 40 to 45. Edmonton firm retailing extras 75 to 80, firsts 65 to 70. Calgary jobbing \$13.50 per case, seconds \$10.50 per case. Vancouver fresh laid firm, paying country points extras 63, firsts 60. Chicago spot 47 to 54 refrigerators, (Novembers) 35 1/2, December 36 1/2. New York extras first 58 to 61, firsts 50 to 57, Decembers 37 1/2.
