THE WALTZ

It was a hundred years ago that the French soldiers then in Rhuringia discovered the peasants dancing a new dance. Even the pressure of the invaders did not destroy their joy in it. Perhaps it was like wine to them. When they were miserable they danced to become happy again, and when they were happy they danced to become happier yet. At any rate the French soldiers were enchanted with this new dance, with the new tempo and the voluptuous swing of it. They set themselves at once to learn the step, and when they returned to France half the army was waltzing mad, for it was the waltz that they had discovered. In a few weeks the waltz craze had spread all over Paris, and had crossed into London. Perhaps the plugging craze of fifteen years ago and the diabolical craze of ten years ago alone are comparable to the waltzing frenzy that spread over society. People waltzed singly along the street. They waltzed upon the grass, the cobble stones and wherever they could walk.

Nevertheless, there was an element in society that pronounced the innovation, and the waltz was not permitted to conquer without fighting for its triumphs. The two most influential women in Paris took sides one for it, the other against it. The champion was Mme. de Stael. Her opponent was Countess de Genlis, who was at that time a sort of governess in the royal family, with great influence over Napoleon. He instructed her to turn her powerful mind upon the matter of the waltz, and to draw up a report on it. This she did, and she reported against the waltz. Napoleon agreed with her. Probably Genlis was against the waltzers retorted that they did it; and perhaps because de Stael was for it, Napoleon refrained from taking a very emphatic position in disapproval. In England Byron was found in strange company. He was with the blue stockings, and provided them with their campaign literature in his "Ode to the Waltz." But the waltzers retorted that they did not recognize Byron as a dictator upon matters of morality—for immorality, indeed, was the sin alleged against the waltz—and gradually the opposition ceased, and the waltz became as firmly and generally established as any dance can in a community where many people believed all dancing to be a sin.

HOW TO KEEP EGGS FRESH

The great secret in keeping eggs consists in entirely excluding the air from the interior. The lining next to the shell is, in its natural state, impervious to air, and the albumen is calculated to sustain it, but dampness and heat will cause decay, and if the eggs are allowed to lie in one position, especially upon one side, the yolk sinks through the albumen and settles upon the lining, and, not possessing proper qualities for preserving the skin in a healthy condition, it dries and air penetrates, and begins the work of destruction. Where eggs are set upon their small ends, the yolk is much less liable to reach the lining of the shell. Where eggs are packed in a barrel, keg or bucket, it is a good plan to turn the whole quantity on to a different side in a while.

PROPOSALS WITH FLOWERS

In remote Alpine hamlets and villages, especially in the Bernese Ober-

land, these still exist—ancient and pretty customs of proposing marriage by the language of flowers. If a maid accepts a bouquet of edelweiss from a man, she, at the same time accepts him as her fiance, the man being that the man has risked his life to obtain the flowers for the woman he loves. Another method which exists in the canton of Glarus is for the young man to place a flower pot containing a single rose and a note on the window sill of the girl's room when she is absent from home and wait—perhaps days—for a reply. If the maid takes the rose, the young man boldly enters the house to arrange matters with her parents, and if the rose is allowed to fade away the proposal is rejected without a single word having been exchanged between the couple.

Sometimes a fickle girl will keep a young man waiting a day or two for an answer, but whatever it may be is considered final.—New York telegram.

NEW PRESIDENT OF ROYAL TRUST COMPANY.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of The Royal Trust Company, last week, Mr. H. V.
