PLAY-GROUNDS SUGGESTED—Co-operation of local service clubs will be asked in the promotion of some form of supervised playgrounds for school children during the coming summer holidays. It was decided at a meeting last night of the Holy Name Society of the Holy Redeemer Church. The suggestion for such playgrounds was unanimously indorsed at the meeting but it was felt that the co-operation of the service clubs would be necessary to the project. One or more of the public squares, it is believed, could be utilized for playground purposes. Equipment would be inexpensive, but a supervisor would be required. In other cities supervised playgrounds have been established for years, and are looked upon as a necessity. Mr. Benj. Rogers has installed at his garage in Euston Street a new up-to-date device for opening and closing the door without inconvenience or trouble. It consists of a lever, weights and springs, by which the door is opened upward on a swing, allowing the car to pass in or out under. The door is opened by a key in the usual way, but when unlocked, instead of pushing or pulling it open, it is lifted by a handle and then automatically slides into its position above the car. AT NO TIME FOR MANY YEARS

has the roads of the province been in as good condition in the Spring as at the present time. Favorable comments from people residing in various parts of the Island are heard daily. The present satisfactory condition of the highways is attributed by officials to the Department of Public Works to the split log d'agging, which was ordered to be begun as early in the Spring as possible. In all parts of the province teams with drags were at work as soon as the roads had dried out sufficiently. Early in May the road machines were put into operation on the drier highways, and at the present time thirty-five are engaged in the grading work.

WEDNESDAY

JUDGMENT IN CHANCERY CASE—A judgment of much importance was given last week by Mr. Justice Saunders, Master of the Rolls, in a chancery case, wherein the P. E. I. Mutual Insurance Co., and another were complainants and Oliver Best and another were defendants. The suit involved an attempt on behalf of the complainants to set aside a suit of conveyance given by defendant to son at a date anterior to a judgment received against him. Hearing of the suit occupied two days last February when judgment was reserved for argument at a later date. His Lordship gave written judgment dismissing the complainants' bill. The case is considered as quite important as the judgment affects a number of late cases of conveyance of father to son while the father had outstanding obligations. Thane A. Campbell, K.C., and J. O. C. Campbell appeared for the complainants and Nell McLeod, K. C., and C.D. McCallum for the defendants. It is understood that an appeal will be entered.

INJURED WHEN HORSE BOLTED

Thrown from their carriage when their horse ran away, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Blaquiere, Toronto, and their daughter, Miss Nora, received severe injuries at Hope River on Sunday last. The carriage was overturned when the animal bolted, with the result that all three were precipitated heavily to the ground. Mr. Blaquiere sustained several fractured ribs, and all three suffered from the severe shock. Miss Blaquiere who is a talented musician and amateur actress was to have taken part in a play at Hope River on Monday night.

BEGINNING THIS MORNING

A determined effort will be made by the City Police with the assistance of a dog-catcher to rigidly enforce the by-laws relating to dogs. Special officer James Lawlor has been chosen to carry out the work. The by-laws forbid the running at large of dogs, whether tagged or not. The only condition under which dogs are permitted on the streets is that they be under the immediate control of the owner or some competent person. Dogs caught by the police may be returned to the owner, only on payment by the latter of two dollars. Any dogs found running at large after the owner has been notified shall be deemed habitually at large, and may be destroyed by the police.

REDUCTION THIS SUMMER

in car ferry rates on automobiles to \$3.00 one way, or \$5.00 for the return trip, with the promise of consideration of a further reduction next year if the anticipated increase in automobile traffic to and from the Province materializes, has been obtained from the Canadian National Railway authorities as a result of a delegation headed by Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Acting Premier, with Hon. John A. MacDonald, M. P., and Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault, pres'dent of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Association.

HON. DR. MACMILLAN

returned last evening from Ottawa and Montreal where he spent several days interviewing heads of various departments on matters of provincial importance, expressed satisfaction with the manner in which the Railway authorities received the brief urging reduced automobile rates on the car ferry. The first interview took place in Montreal on Tuesday, the case being presented to Mr. Alister Fraser, C. N. R., Vice President in charge of traffic. The proposal of the delegation was for a two dollar trip and three dollars return. Emphasis was placed on the fact that the present rate acted as a deterrent to prospective motor tourists and that it constituted a discrimination against this Province. Mr. Appleton, C. N. R., general manager, was present during part of the discussion. On the following morning the delegation returned and was given the assurance of a reduced rate this summer of three dollars, one way, or five dollars return trip, with the promise of consideration of a further reduction next year in the event of the new rates working out satisfactorily. The \$3 and \$5 rates will go into effect on June 15 and will continue until Sept. 15.
