Heated Discussion On Divorce Bills

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, April 21.—The increased grant for the Toronto Terminal Railway Co. and divorce bills provided the highlights of yesterday's discussions in the House of Commons with some political compliments exchanged over the expenditure of harbor improvement monies in the Eastern Provinces.

Divorce bills were up twice yesterday. During the afternoon there was quite a heated discussion and again in the evening. The labor members led the attack on the method adopted by the House in disposing of the bills and objected strenuously to the House being used merely as a rubber stamp for Senate legislation.

A division was forced on the issue of whether the committee would continue its consideration of the divorce bill or let it stand over. The Premier said his motion was to get these private bills out of the way, R. Gardiner, the Progressive leader, said the divorce bills should come to the courts, Mr. Woodsworth said it was disgraceful. The bills were bunched and passed in tens and twenties and no real consideration was ever given to any of them.
