THE BAUD ARRIVES AT HALIFAX

Enroute to World Fair and Possible Encounter With the Bluenose.

HALIFAX, July 31—The fleet Gertrude L. Thebaud, swiftest of United States fishing schooners, nosed out of Halifax Harbor today and was slipping tonight up the Nova Scotia coast toward Chicago and a possible encounter with Nova Scotia's Bluenose, her conqueror in international racing.

Bars sticks glistening in the afternoon sun, the sleek Gloucesterman which will represent Massachusetts at the Chicago Fair slid down harbor under auxiliary power to an accompaniment of screaming whistles as steamers along the waterfront gave the racer a roistering farewell at the end of her short stay in Halifax.

Voyage Delayed

The Thebaud put into harbor late Saturday for repairs to a cylinder head of her diesel plant. Her voyage from Gloucester to Quebec City, was delayed for over 24 hours, but Captain Ben Pine said he expected to complete the first stage of the trip up the Great Lakes by Wednesday at the latest. Captain Pine, veteran of many a salt-water battle with Bluenose, is making this trip as a passenger. Young Jimmy Abbot, who handles the big racer on the banks, is at the wheel this time, his crew made up mainly of fishing skipper who have deserted the banks in hope of another clash with the rival Bluenose.

Race In Prospect

A fresh-water race between Thebaud and Bluenose has been in prospect for months, ever since Captain Angus Walters and owners of the Lunenburg first decided to let the banker go to the Fair under charter. Captain Angus says he is willing to race the Thebaud on fresh water, though not for the International Trophy Bluenose has held since 1921. That is exclusively a salt-water honor. The Canadian vessel already has proved her mettle on brineless seas by trimming the best sailing cruisers the lakes could offer.

Captain Pine Doubtful

Captain Ben Pine said today he was doubtful about the likelihood of a race. "Our engine would be quite a handicap in a race," the stocky skipper declared. "And besides, we're going to be at the Fair only a short time, so there may not be time to get things ready for a brush."

ARHMEDABAD, India, July 31

Mahatma Gandhi announced today his decision to disband his "Ashram" or college of devotees at Sabarmati to embark on a "fresh and sacred mission in life."

The Indian leader explained that he must discontinue his seminary because it was to him the most precious thing on earth. Hundreds and thousands of people, he said, had lost everything in the struggle for Indian independence and he felt that it was up to him and the members of the "Ashram" to make a sacrifice on the eve of embarking on a new "sacred mission."

The nature of the mission was not disclosed, but it was believed that it is your intention to sever your connection with our school at the close of this school term, we, as pupils, feel that we cannot let this opportunity pass without expressing to you how deeply and truly we regret to learn of your decision and how grateful we are for what you have done for us since your first came among us as our instructor and guide. During the three years you have been with us you have striven earnestly and faithfully to do your duty by us and have left nothing undone which could have been done for our advancement.

Though we, no doubt, many times, tried your patience to the utmost, yet you were always patient and kind. This is now the third term of years you have occupied the position of teacher in our school and we trust that, though you are now bidding us "good-bye" it will be as here-to-fore, only for a season.

Wherever you may go and in whatever circumstances you may be placed, you may have the assurance that none will be more sincerely glad to hear of your continued welfare and success, than we, your pupils of New Glasgow School will be.

Recaptured Prisoner Is Brought To Trial

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, July 31—Police had to guard a closed car between Sange Grande Station and the courthouse yesterday as thousands thronged to see Gabriel Castillo, recaptured prisoner, brought to trial. Castillo, with James Hinds and Joseph Bango, escaped from a train after conviction for robbery, and lived in the Trinidad forests, robbing for a living.

Finally Castillo was captured, and led police to Hinds' dead body. Bango was taken later.

Yesterday Castillo was arraigned on nine charges of robbery, growing out of activities while the three were evading the police. He was remanded until August 2. Meanwhile, 30 members of the constabulary responsible for the captures shared \$75 distributed by the Inspector General.
