LONDON, Nov. 25—(CP)—Sport shorts from Britain: Ryan Greenmount of Bury is said there were witnesses to this golfing feat.

To celebrate the anniversary of his first hole-in-one, Greenmount, played a round over the course where he scored his act. When he came to the 140-yard hole where he previously sank his tee shot, he swung freely and dropped the ball into the cup for another hole-in-one.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25—(CP)—Hockey Simmering: The Rangers are going to modify their streamlined type of hockey which won them the Stanley Cup two years ago... Blue Bombers Head east for Rugby final

WINNIPEG, Nov. 25—(CP)—Winnipeg Blue Bombers loaded with football power for a starting reserve strength that helped them win the Canadian championship in 1935 and 39, entrained for the east tonight. They meet Ottawa's eastern intercollegiate, the Rough Riders, in Toronto, Saturday with the Grey Cup at stake.

Coach Reg Trefall led his 25 players eastward to climax a gruelling season in which Bombers won 10 games and lost six. They have scored 166 points to their opponents' 143 and their competition included one of the best teams on the continent, Columbus Bulls, American Professional League champions.

Bombers opened the season Aug. 26 with a 19-12 victory over Bulls, who trained here. Bulls took the second and third games of the exhibition series 6-0 and 31-1. Bombers also dropped two exhibition games to Kenosha (Wisconsin) Cardinals, a semi-professional team, 18-16 and 36-8.

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New Manager For Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Nov. 25—(AP)—Lou Boudreau, Cleveland's 24-year-old shortstop, tonight was named field manager of the Indians on a two-year contract, becoming the youngest baseball pilot of major league history.

The appointment was announced by Alva Bradley, President of the Cleveland baseball club, a few hours after the post had been vacated by the elevation of Roger T. Peckinpaugh to the front office job of vice president. Bradley said "I suppose he's the youngest baseball manager ever named, but indicated that he had overcome any hesitation on that score. 'The more I thought, the more I thought here's the fellow who knows all the ball players,'" he said.

The shortstop, chosen the most valuable Cleveland player in 1941 by the Cleveland chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association, joined the Indians late in the 1939 season and has starred ever since.

Rookie Paces Rangers To 5-4 Victory Over Chicago Black Hawks In Overtime

NEW YORK, Nov. 25—(AP)—Rookie Norman Burns, playing in his third professional game, tonight set up the plays for two overtime goals as New York Rangers defeated Chicago 5-4 and went into fourth place in the National Hockey League standings.

It was the first overtime game in Madison Square Garden this season and 12,622 fans thought the Rangers had lost it when young Alex Kaleta of the Hawks scored early in the extra period. But Bryan Hextall, scoring his second goal of the night, tied the score with the overtime half gone, snaring Burns' short rebound, and when Earl Seibert, the Hawks' veteran defenceman, drew a penalty a minute later, Mac Colville sank a 60-foot shot from the blue line for the winning goal after Burns had fed him a neat pass.

Boston Bruins Overwhelm Detroit Red Wings 7-1

BOSTON, Nov. 25—(AP)—Boston Bruins overwhelmed Detroit Red Wings 7-1 before 12,000 at the Boston Garden tonight. It was the Stanley Cup champions' second victory in three nights over the Wings.

The Bruins with an amazing display of marksmanship, registered one out of every three shots they aimed at goalie Johnny Mowers during the action that was much more exciting than the top-heavy score indicated. Woody Dumart, who opened the scoring, wound up with two goals, as did Roy Conacher. The other Boston tallies came off the sticks of Bill Cowley, Flash Hollett and Eddie Wiseman. In addition to scoring unassisted, Cowley, who led the league's scorers last season, also contributed three assists. The lone Detroit goal came during the 18th minute of the second-period action, while Milt Schmidt was serving time in the penalty box. When he went off the ice, Detroit rushed in five forwards. They ganged the Boston zone and their persistent passing attack bore fruit when Syd Howe fired out of a corner to Carl Liscombe, who blasted in a shot that travelled about 58 feet.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 25—(AP)—J. Thompson (Doc) Prothro says he doesn't expect to manage the National League Phillies again next year, and he's afraid to jump into a minor league job because "times are dangerous." Pilot of the senior circuit's tail-end club for the last three years, Prothro said he had not been in touch with President Gerry Nugent of the Phils for several months "but the chances are I won't be back." It has been reported at various times that Hans Lobert, listed on the Phils roster as a coach, would step into Prothro's job next season.

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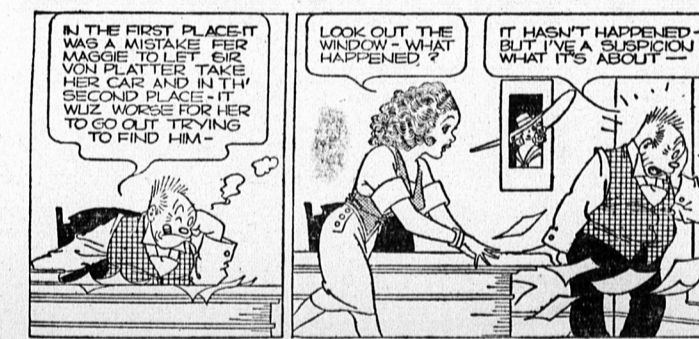
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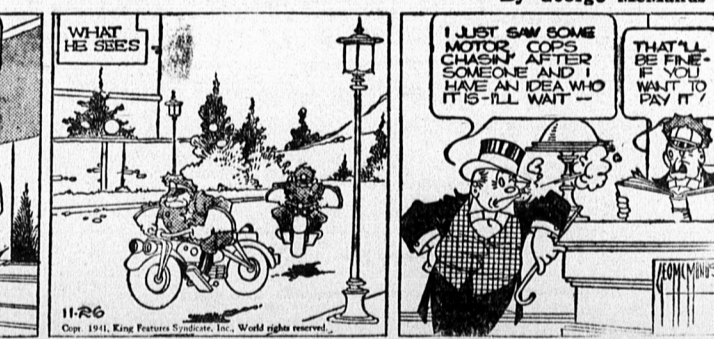
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
