BRITAIN PROTESTS ITALIAN PRESS ATTACKS

VIOLENCE THREATENS IN FRENCH STRIKE

Complaints Laid Before Envoy; League Derided

Siam Revolt Nipped By Loyalists

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

BANGKOK, Siam, Aug. 7.—Soldiers patrolled the streets of Siam's capital tonight after a widespread plot to overthrow the government technically headed by little 11-year-old King Ananda was smashed.

This subversive movement, the third in less than two years, began among non-commissioned officers of the regular army. Officials said the plotters planned to seize and kill their superior officers and once in control of the nation's armed forces, to take over the government.

Prompt and vigorous action by loyalists apparently ended the movement before it got well started. The number of revolutionaries arrested was not disclosed but a special court was appointed to try them.

While the uprising was being nipped, young King Ananda was far from the scene. He is continuing his studies in Lausanne, Switzerland.

Ananda was proclaimed King last March, four days after his uncle, King Prajadhipok, abdicated.

GUARD AGAINST NATIONWIDE DISORDERS

Liner Sailings Delayed Following Refusal Of Crews To Accept Salary Cuts.

(By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, Aug. 7.—Detachments of cavalry and infantry marched into Brest today as thousands of arsenal workers threatened new violent demonstrations in protest against the Laval decree laws cutting salaries and pensions.

Meanwhile the cabinet wrestled with the problem of an incipient general strike of officers and men of France's big ocean liners. Minister of Merchant Marine William Bertrand was informed that the crews of at least 12 ships would not accept the reduced pay envelopes. The liner Champlain could not leave Le Havre today, and 800 passengers were stranded.

MANY INJURED

In Toulon and Brest and in the populous Montmartre quarter of Paris, where yesterday's protest against the government economies threatened to extend to nationwide disorders. The authorities had re-established order, but casualties of the rioting and strikes of yesterday and today stood at one dead, with 30 policemen and 100 rioters wounded.

Other drastic measures were in effect tonight as precautions against further outbursts by disgruntled government employees. Cavalry details from nearby garrisons were rushed to the centres of disturbance such as Brest, Le Havre, Saint Nazaire and Toulon. The walk out in arsenal at Brest has halted work on France's biggest warship, the Dunkerque.

EMPTY OF CREWS

Around the coast at Le Havre, the big ship floating the tricolor were empty of crews. The Champlain remained moored to her dock as 830 passengers were obliged to seek lodging in the port's hotels awaiting settlement of the seamen's strike.

Post, Rogers Head Northward In Storm

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) SEATTLE, Aug. 7.—Wiley Post and his "itch-hiding" passenger, Will Rogers, flew northward into the teeth of storms tonight—presumably bound for Juneau, Alaska.

The Oklahoma round-the-world flier and his wise-cracking comrade of the airways hopped from Renton Airport, south of here, at 9:15 a.m. P.M. in the big low-winged monoplane in which Post and his wife expect to continue to Moscow.

Mrs. Post, deciding at the last minute the flight might be "too strenuous," remained here. She said she would take her husband "within a few days."

It is approximately 1,000 miles flying distance, from Seattle to Juneau. Amid reports of threatening weather, it was pointed out there are numerous islands and bays where Post and Rogers might pause.

Transients Held By Police Following Train Coup

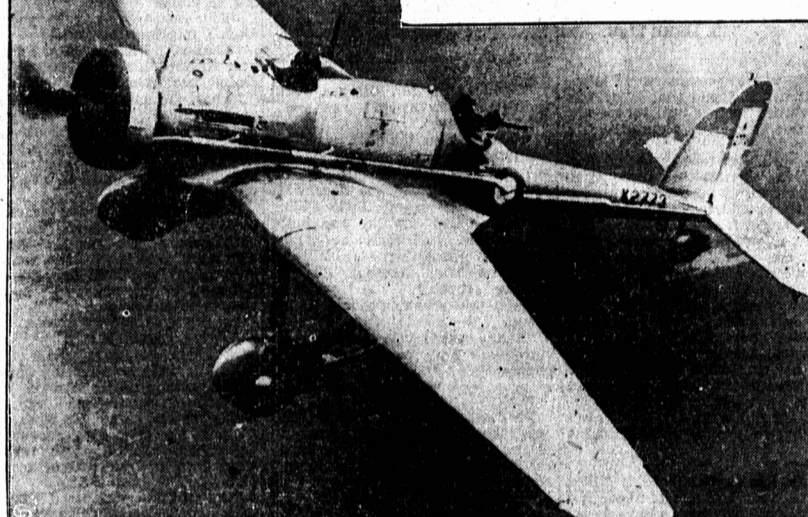
GOLDEN, B. C., Aug. 7.—Greasings of rails and seizure of a Canadian Pacific Railway freight train by 80 transients camped here and in Calgary where 28 men were in custody of Royal Canadian Mounted Police as a result of the coup.

The fast freight train, carrying produce from the Okanagan Valley to the Prairie markets, was brought to a stop here Tuesday night and the transients, beating their way eastward, boarded it. They stood along the right of way as the train came to its halt.

Police and railway authorities today charged the rails had been greased. Pots of grease, it was reported, were found along the tracks.

Liberal Leader At Kingston Speaks "In All Humility"

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) KINGSTON, Ont., Aug. 7.—Hon. Mackenzie King, Liberal Leader, opened his election campaign here tonight, addressing the Central Ontario Liberal Association at its annual meeting. He was speaking in support of his former private secretary, Prof. Norman M. Rogers of Queen's University, Liberal candidate in Kingston.

The Liberal Leader was introduced by Miss Lillian Mowat of Kingston, a niece of Sir Oliver Mowat, a former Ontario Premier and one of the Fathers of Confederation. To a group of Liberal members, Mr. King predicted he and his followers in the next Parliament would not be in opposition benches but 'we will be sitting over on the government benches.'

In All Humility The Liberal Leader said he looked forward in all humility to another term of office as Prime Minister, considering the state of the country. But his past experience told him of the soundness of the country and its people and his faith in the policies of his party.

Just as Sir Wilfrid Laurier gave Canada 15 years of its greatest prosperity, Mr. King said he was sure a Liberal Government today would lead it back to progress. This was especially true, considering the loyal co-operation that had been manifested by the Liberal Party in the 16 years he had been leader.

"Unless," said Mr. King, "there is a party loyal enough, big enough and strong enough to extend as one as one, to co-operate with the Liberal Party in the 16 years he had been leader."

Mr. King referred to the fact there were Liberal governments in every province but one and he predicted Liberals would sweep that in a few weeks. Considering the political complexion of the province, Canada had "a chance as never before for men of one will and of one thought to work together and raise this country out of the depression in which it has been for the last five years."

Pays Tribute Speaking in the home city of Canada's first Prime Minister, Sir John A. Macdonald, Mr. King paid tribute to the memory of the great Conservative leader. Sir John, he said, was a great believer in democracy and in the parliamentary method of government. Were he living today he would stand shoulder to shoulder with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, were the old Liberal chief alive, in.

Bride Fatally Injured In Accident

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Aug. 7.—A bride of 45 minutes, Miss Edna Jenkinson of Stittsville, Ont., was fatally injured today in an automobile accident on the Ashton-Stittsville highway as she was returning with the bridal party to the wedding reception. She died three hours later in the Ottawa Civic Hospital.

The happy wedding was turned into tragedy when the rear wheel of the car in which the bridal party was driving blew out and threw the car into the air. It turned over several times and landed in a demolished heap in the ditch and threw its four passengers on the pavement. The groom was the only member of the party who escaped injury.

NAZIS DRIVE AGAINST JEWS INTENSIFIED

Non-Aryans Pouring Into Berlin From Provinces For Safety.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BERLIN, Aug. 7.—Reports of anti-Jewish violence, mass meetings and what apparently was the suicide of a Jew in "protective custody" marked Nazism's drive tonight against non-Aryans.

An official announcement said more measures would be adopted to halt the stream of Jews pouring into Berlin from the provinces for safety. The nature of the program was not divulged.

Dies From Injuries

In small towns the drive against the Jews continued unabated. At Gladbach, Karl Frenkel, a Jewish cattle-dealer who was taken into "protective custody" on a charge of racial turpitude, died from injuries suffered when he apparently jumped from the third floor of the jail.

Authorities of Bavaria closed the Park Hotel at Bad Tösch, an exclusively Jewish establishment, on the ground that the Jews' behaviour had brought protests from all Aryans at the Spa. (The Jewish Telegraphic Agency said the burgo-master ordered all Jews to leave Bad Tösch within 24 hours and that 350, including sick and aged, were affected.)

The Mayor of Andernach-on-Rhine ordered an inscription on the synagogue. "Do we not all have one Father? Do we not all have one God?" removed. His decree was upheld by the district governor. The decision followed the appearance of Hitler youths before the synagogue shouting in union "we do not have the same God as Jews."

The acting Evangelical Bishop of Berlin, Canon Eckert, in a statement to the press declared: "Whoever seeks to glorify Jews shuts himself out of the ranks of those who under Hitler seek to root out the Jewish evil from Germany."

Republican Victory In Rhode Island

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—The surprise Republican victory in the Rhode Island congressional election was generally interpreted tonight as a significant defeat for President Roosevelt and the new deal.

Vote of the little New England state's first district, who sent a Rooseveltian Democrat to Congress with a majority of 21,000 votes last election, yesterday returned former Judge Charles Risk who was against the new deal "lock, stock and barrel." They gave Risk a majority of close to 13,000 votes over State Treasurer Antonio Prince, who campaigned on the slogan, "Shall it be back to Hoover or forward with Roosevelt?"

Substantive Republicans changed that tonight to "It shall be back to the Republicans in the 1936 general elections." It seems crystal clear President Roosevelt will stand then for re-election. There is no telling who his Republican opponent will be.

Mystery Fire Sweeps New U.S. Navy Cruiser

QUINCY, Mass., Aug. 7.—Fire swept the United States Navy's newest cruiser today, and the big 10,000-ton U. S. S. Quincy lay crippled at her dock.

While officials of the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation, her builder, and Navy officials sought to explain the cause of the blaze, they unofficially estimated the loss might reach \$100,000.

The blaze was confined largely to the extremely expensive master switchboard in the engine room boiler and the main cables and other wiring which lead from it. Navy officials said no current was being generated in the ship and it was seemingly undetermined

Wild Ethiopian Tribesmen Clamor For War. Preparations Continue Apace In Africa.

LONDON, Aug. 7.—Great Britain has made "strong representations" to Italy about the anti-British press campaign that has been waged there in connection with British efforts to find a way to peaceful solution of the Italo-Ethiopian disputes.

The recent representations, made to Dino Grandi, Italian Ambassador, July 26, were kept secret because it was felt then they might hurt the chance of success of deliberations at Geneva.

Officials reminded Grandi that the British press has shown restraint in dealing with the Italo-Ethiopian dispute and that anti-British attacks not only would cause irritation here but were calculated to disturb relations between the two countries.

BALDWIN ON VACATION

Ramsay MacDonald became acting Prime Minister today, as Stanley Baldwin went on his annual vacation to France. Baldwin went to the work with Italy gaining control of Ethiopia, the government feels that Lake Tsana, source of the water supply for the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan at the head of the Blue Nile, will be safe from molestation.

Right Recognized

Italy has always recognized Great Britain's interest in Lake Tsana, as well as its economic interests in Ethiopia, and the government has no reason to feel that Italy will change these views. The question of Lake Tsana is not expected to be raised during the Paris tri-power conference.

Ethiopia's 30-year plan to build a dam at Lake Tsana to regulate the flow, and permit the use of the excess water for irrigation and other purposes was postponed on account of the present dispute with Italy.

Italy agreed in 1925 to support Britain's interests in the lake.

EAGER FOR ACTION

ADDIS ABABA, Aug. 7.—(A.P.)—A growing war fever in Ethiopia is giving chiefs a difficult time in remaining "not blooded warriors, eager to start for frontiers of Italian colonies, reports today from outlying districts said.

A demonstration of the tribesmen's loyalty and determination to defend Ethiopia's plains would be held on the plains of northern Wollo Province, near Gondar. There 100,000 warriors passed in review before 19 year old Crown Prince Asfa Wusien.

The Crown Prince, it was said, can muster a force of some 120,000 men, 60,000 of them cavalrymen.

Paris reports that Asfa Wusien had rebelled against his father were officially denied. It was said they apparently were based on erroneous information or a misinterpretation of the fanatic enthusiasm of the fanatical troops in review.

Also denied was a rumor that a Japanese military mission had started from Kobe for Ethiopia.

GAS MASKS AVAILABLE

Foreign residents of the capital heard reports 3,000 gas masks have already arrived and 25,000 others are en route. Because of its 7,000 foot altitude and the distance from Italian bases it was considered doubtful Italian planes would be able to reach the capital with heavy destructive bombs, but would have to confine aerial attacks to small gas bombs.

Emperor Haile Selassie, who is working 18 hours a day, repeated assurances foreigners would be (Continued on Page 9)

Two Women Convicted Of "Torso" Slaying

CHICAGO, August 7.—Two women in the 40's each blaming the other for arranging the gruesome "torso" slaying of Ervin J. Lang, 28-year-old grocery clerk—were convicted today of his murder.

Standing before Judge Cornelius Harrington, Mrs. Blanche Dunkel, 43, Lang's mother-in-law who admitted she plotted his death because of jealousy, and Mrs. Evelyn Smith, 47, who confessed she killed him and hacked off his legs, heard the verdict which may send them to the electric chair. Sentence will be passed tomorrow afternoon.

They were tried without jury. Mrs. Smith, who from the witness stand told the court of Mrs. Dunkel's request that Lang be killed of how he was strangled with drink, drugged, and then garroted in her apartment, smiled faintly as she heard the verdict.
