EMPEROR WILLIAM HONORED.

It is quite clear that an effort is being made on the solemn occasion of the death of Queen Victoria to draw closer together the Empires of Britain and Germany. Though the royal houses of the two nations are so closely related there has been during the few years past some estrangement of feeling between the British and German peoples. The latter have from the first had a strong feeling of sympathy for the Dutch people of South Africa in their quarrel with the British authorities. At one time some years ago the Emperor apparently shared the feelings of his people in that regard and his very indiscreet telegram to President Kruger tended to provoke hostile feeling between the courts of St. James and Berlin.

Since that time by the sedulous efforts of British diplomacy a better understanding between the two Governments has been arrived at. An entirely satisfactory arrangement was brought about by Mr. Chamberlain in regard to the position and claims of the two nations in Africa. More recently a full accord, almost amounting to an alliance, placed Britain and Germany side by side in certain demands in regard to the affairs of China. This was all most satisfactory to the British people, but it had not wholly restored the friendly feeling of the German people as it existed in former years.

Now another forward step is taken in the action of King Edward in appointing the Emperor of Germany on the occasion of his birthday, Field Marshal of the British Army. The relations between our present King and his Imperial nephew have long been of the most cordial and friendly nature and the honor now conferred no doubt has sprung in part from this personal favor and in part a stroke of diplomacy intended to favorably affect the minds of the German people. It is not uncommon for one nation to confer an honorary military title upon a ruler or prince of another nation. Thus the German Emperor was already Colonel in Chief of the First Royal Dragoons; the Emperor Nicholas is Colonel in Chief of the Second Dragoons and the Emperor Francis Joseph holds a like position in the First (Kings) Dragoon Guards.

It is much more to be a Field Marshal than a Colonel and the high military honor to which he has been now appointed is one to which Emperor William is particularly susceptible. His ancestors on the paternal side have all been military commanders of note and to be the "War Lord" of the German Empire is counted no less honor than to be its Emperor. There were hitherto but eight Field Marshals in the British Empire. These were H. R. H. the Duke of Cambridge; H. R. H. the Prince of Wales (now King); Sir John Simons, Sir Frederick Haines, Lord Wolseley, Lord Roberts, Prince William of Saxe Weimar, and Sir Neville Chamberlain.

Emperor William, now a Field Marshal, in the British Army, has been for some time one of the seven Admirals of the Fleet, our highest naval rank, first among whom is King Edward. Under them are 12 Admirals, 22 Vice Admirals, and 48 Rear Admirals on the active list.

Very great interest was taken yesterday in the election trial, the Court Room being crowded. Both Messrs. McKinnon and Martin are respectively represented by a strong array of counsel.

"Churchman's" letter is evidently written under a misapprehension of the facts. The "national churches" will not be "closed" on the occasion to which he refers.

The somewhat improbable rumor was given out a day or two ago that King Edward desires to be known as His Imperial Majesty to emphasize the fact that he is Emperor as well as King. It is true that to more than half His Majesty's subjects, those residing in India, he is Emperor. But to the people of the United Kingdom, the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia and the Colonies generally he must be officially known as their King and not as their Emperor. We have become accustomed to the phrases, "the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty," and "Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen." The proposed title of "His Imperial Majesty" expresses a degree of power greater than obtains in countries possessing a limited monarchy, and the assumption of such a title might be challenged in the British Isles. None the less, while Emperors take precedence over Kings many might desire to have the ruler of the British Empire entitled to rank with the very greatest of earthly potentates.

A proclamation signed by the Secretary of State, Ottawa, appoints and sets apart Saturday, the second day of February next, as a day of general mourning to be observed by all persons throughout our Dominion of Canada. Furthermore there has been forwarded from the Herald's College, London, an order that it is expected that all persons upon the present occasion of the death of Her Late Majesty of blessed and glorious memory, do put themselves into deepest mourning, the said mourning to begin upon the 28th instant.
