VILLAGE READING ROOMS.

With the coming of the long winter evenings the importance and value of the village library or reading room becomes more and more impressed upon the minds of thoughtful persons. Young men and young women like the companionship of their fellows and naturally desire to meet together. They have less constant employment and more leisure time in the winter than at other seasons, while at the same time healthful winter sports and pastimes are comparatively few in the smaller villages and country districts. To all such a well-selected and well-kept library and reading room would supply a great want—an enjoyable place of meeting where the evening hours could be comfortably and profitably whiled away.

The requirements are comparatively easy of attainment, a room warmed and lighted, with some one in charge, and sufficient books, magazines and papers to supply reading for those who may assemble. The cost need not be great, and would, of course, be proportioned to the size of the village and the number of reading patrons. For the smaller places a simple reading room of magazines, newspapers and some books of reference would be a great boon. For a larger settlement or village a library, from which books could be obtained and taken to the homes, and a reading room combined with it would be required.

The work of starting or organizing a reading room or library for a small community is, undertaken in various ways. Sometimes one of our numerous fraternal societies undertakes the work as a means of increasing or retaining its membership. Better still a meeting of citizens is called and a library society or a literary society is formed, money subscribed and books and magazines purchased. If a debating society or a series of debates, literary evenings, or lectures are connected therewith so much the better. Discussion stimulates reading, and reading supplies ideas, facts and arguments for discussion. The interchange of ideas is informing, and debate stimulates the reasoning as well as the speaking faculties.

Another valuable purpose of the village library with its auxiliaries is that it serves to keep young men away from questionable or demoralising resorts. A valued correspondent refers to this feature of the case, claiming that many young men who are now led to spend their evenings in the illegal rumshops from want of some healthful and informing place of resort, would gladly avail themselves of the privileges of a library if such were offered them. Many clergymen and teachers realize the moral as well as the intellectual value of the village library, and its uplifting influence in a community, and would cheerfully lend their aid and support toward establishing one in their midst.

Summerside, to its praise be it said, has taken the lead among our Island towns in the matter of a public library while Charlottetown is a painful laggard in the race. We trust that Souris, Georgetown and other populous centres will before long take action to supply their citizens with books and magazines in like fashion. When the Island becomes bedstedded with libraries to right and left and all around, their reflex influence may be felt even in the Island capital with good results.

The New York World is filled with admiration for the new dynamite gun recently mounted and tested at Fisher's Island. It declares the gun to be the most formidable engine of destruction in the world, and such as must make a naval attack upon land fortifications an impossibility. This faith is the more remarkable from the insignificant and disappointing results of the dynamite cruiser in the Spanish war. But the new gun appears to be a great improvement upon that carried by the Vesuvius. It is claimed that in the recent trials it developed satisfactory accuracy at all ranges. It threw shells, each carrying 500 pounds of nitro gelatin—enough to destroy any ship afloat—3,000 yards. It threw six-inch shells each carrying 50 lbs of the dynamite, nearly 8,000 yards. It proved itself an excellent rapid fire gun for smaller projectiles at the practical fighting range—2,500 yards. Within twelve minutes it accurately delivered four dynamite shells each weighing more than half a ton.
