**Detailed Report Of This Week's Sessions Of United Church Presbytery**

The Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met at two o'clock on Monday afternoon, May 9th, for conference and discussion, with the Rev. T. A. Wilson in the chair. Rev. D. M. Sinclair, chairman of the Evangelism and Social Service Committee introduced the subjects to be discussed. Rev. F. E. Boothroyd read a paper on "The Minister and His Personal Religion." This was followed by much helpful discussion. Rev. G. A. Christie presented a thought-provoking article on "The Congregation in Action." We are altogether too fearful of breaking away from the old conventional ways of doing Church work, when these ways are proving wholly inadequate to meet modern needs.

At the evening session Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson led a discussion on "The Quest of a Christian Social Order." Jesus conceived of society as a unit, in which Fatherhood and Brotherhood coalesced. Business is the field with which the larger part, say 9-10, of our active life is concerned. Unless this spirit of brotherhood functions there, it does not really touch human life. It is not much use saying "Our Father" in Church and being anything but a brother outside.

The lack of brotherhood in modern business can be demonstrated in three ways. (1) The motive of business is self interest, an organized acquisitiveness. Can we expect this kind of thing to prosper with a God of Father-love over all? What has saved it thus far are the many good motives that are mingled with it, e. g., service to society, skill, provision for ones family. These things have helped to save it. (2) The method is wrong, competition. One industry competes with another dividing the Father's children into conflicting groups and classes. (3) The management. Practically every other organization is democratically organized. In business there is a dominating class. They say to the Church, to Labour, "hands off, this is our job." What say has the consumer today in big business? None. Business is autocratic. Is it not high time that the leaders of industry be confronted with the Christian challenge? They cannot continue to take out of the common treasure so large a proportion that the labouring classes are not able to buy back that which they helped to create. Mr. Nicholson's subject proved to be of great interest and provoked much discussion.

**Investments Jeopardized By New Law**

MEXICO CITY, May 15—(A.P.)—British and United States investments totalling several hundred millions of dollars are jeopardized by the new "public utility law" of the state of Hidalgo, Jose Cruz Y. Celis, President of the National Mexican Chamber of Commerce, declared today.

The law makes private property liable to confiscation "for public utility" on payment of three per cent of its value. Twenty years is allowed for payment of the other 97 per cent.

The measure provides that if the state government decides, after several years of control, that a property is not suitable as a "public utility", it may be returned to the private owners, who must reimburse the state for all payments made under the condemnation proceedings.

**Picnic Party Ends In Death**

TAUNTON, Mass., May 15—A picnic party in the woods at Assonet today ended with the death of a Taunton School principal, killed apparently by a stray bullet, and the arrest of two Fall River men on charges of manslaughter.

Miss Mildred L. Wheeler, 41, principal of a primary school here, had left the party for a stroll in the woods when she fell, fatally wounded.

Two hours later Vincent Hancock, 26, and Joseph Mulaney, 28, both of Fall River, were taken in custody and admitted, police said, they had been shooting at a target a short distance from the spot where Miss Wheeler was shot.

**Honor Dickens**

(By Thomas T. Champion, Canadian Press Staff Writer)

LONDON, May 15—(Canadian Press Cable)—Connoisseurs of Charles Dickens from every part of the English-speaking globe gathered over the week-end at the ancient Kenilworth city of Rochester for the Whitinside convention of Dickensians.

Joyality—the dominant note in Dickens' novels—prevailed in a spot peopled by the ghosts of the masters' immortal creations, a spot made famous by Gadshill Place, a mansion Dickens admired as a struggling youth and in which he died, an author of world-wide repute. There was much rivalry amongst the delegation for the honor of occupying Mr. Tupman's bedroom at the "Bull Inn" where the scapegrace Jingle, Mr. Winkle and Dr. Slumner enacted their hilarious roles.

A pilgrimage was planned to Gadshill Place and an excursion to the fine old farmstead which many critics believe to be the original Gadshill. The convention was attended by Sir Henry Dickens, the novelist's only surviving son, now 83 years old. Sir Henry as common sergeant of the City of London has long presided at criminal trials at the Old Bailey, described at length in David Copperfield, and has become noted for his leniency towards rogues.

**RESOLUTIONS**

The Rev. D. M. Sinclair submitted the following resolutions from the committee on Evangelism and Social Service, which were carried.

That congregations through their official boards be asked to stress the advisability and obligation of every woman in the congregation to become a member of the W. M. S., or its associated organizations. Further that the W. M. S. and its associated organizations endeavor to promote attendance and interest in the regularly organized work of the congregation, such as Y. P. S., Sunday Schools and the regular church services.

That Presbytery re-emphasize the need for a still more intensive cultivation of the inner life of our ministry.

Recognizing the failure of our congregations to be sufficiently active in applying the spirit of Christ to our community life, urges upon them the need of a more intensive study of social conditions with a view to bringing them into closer harmony with the ideals of our Master.

**Resolved that, inasmuch as we have passed through a period of two years of extreme economic dislocation and consequent social distress for multitudes of our Canadian people, this Presbytery urge that the executive of our General Council initiate a movement to bring together in conference the nationally recognized leaders in industry, finance, Church and State, to consider the problems confronting us and the disastrous results of past industrial leadership, and challenging our industrial leaders to apply their acknowledged administrative and executive gifts to discover some more effective way for incorporating the spirit of Brotherhood in our economic life, and thus procure for the masses of our people a fuller share of their rights as members of a Christian community.**

**Resolved further that Conference be requested to endorse this resolution.**

**The Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson was asked to support this resolution before Conference.**

**The Secretary presented the statistical report indicating a number of decreases in giving, but an increase in the number of baptisms, marriages and new members. There was an increase of \$62,900 in insurance on church property.**

**Mr. Aitken also reported that the appeal for clothing and food for the West met with a one hundred percent response from the churches of the United Church on the Island. 105 parcels, boxes, and five cars food-stuffs were sent and gratefully received.**

**Rev. F. E. Boothroyd and Rev. L. P. Archibald were appointed to the Settlement Committee for 1932.**

**Presbytery nominated Rev. F. E. Boothroyd and Mr. G. Frank Hutchison as commissioners to the General Council. The Chairman of Presbytery, Secretary, and Chairman of Committee on Evangelism and Social Service were appointed a committee to prepare a report on Church life and work for the Conference.**
