Inquest Into Death Of Mr. John Y. Phillips

A coroner's jury last night found that the death in a motor car accident of John Y. Phillips, Summerside, at Churchill, Queen's County, Sept. 25, 1947, was "caused by heart failure or injuries sustained in the accident."

The inquest was held at the Catholic Funeral Home by Coroner Dr. Ira J. Yeo, with the jury consisting of Messrs. Merritt Forsythe (foreman), Hawley Crockett, Jack Herman, Lloyd Moore, Wally Scantlebury, Howard MacLennan and A. B. Cuddehe, Mr. Gordon Holmes presided the Crown.

The first witness was Mr. Ernest Moore, Summerside, who said that he was riding in the back of a truck about 500 feet ahead of the car driven by the deceased, when he saw it swerve to the left at the curve at the top of the hill, and then turn sharply right, the car turning over three or four times and landing up in the ditch on all four wheels.

Dr. Harold Shaw testified that he performed an autopsy on the deceased on September 29th, and that he had a fractured jaw, multiple fractures of the ribs and internal injuries, and that the heart showed sufficient evidence of heart trouble to cause his death but that the injuries sustained in the accident were also sufficient to cause death.

Written Statements Three other witnesses, Mrs. Archie Sharpe, Mrs. Muriel Smith and Mrs. Robert Phillips, all of Summerside, and occupants of the car, were not in attendance at the inquest, but testified by sworn written statements.

Mrs. Phillips' statement in brief, was that at the time of the accident she saw the deceased slumped over in the seat, and that the car swerved left and then to the right, but that she didn't remember anything clearly after that. The other two witnesses, in slightly different words, gave about the same testimony.

Dr. A. R. Grant, Summerside, testified in a written statement that he examined the deceased about a year ago, and that he was suffering from a heart ailment, and that Mr. Phillips' chief complaint at the time was that he was experiencing dizzy spells.

Officer Watt of the R.C.M.P., on giving his testimony, said that he received the accident call about 12:35 A.M. and that he and another officer arrived at the scene of the accident at 1:30 A.M., and that evidence showed that the car had swerved left and then sharp right and that the car turned over about three times covering a distance of about 71 feet before coming to rest in the ditch on the right hand side.

Polish Treasures Mystery Revived

By Ross Munro OTTAWA, Oct. 2 (CP)—The year-old mystery of the vanished Polish state treasures was suddenly revived here today when an External Affairs Department spokesman emphatically denied Warsaw press allegations that the Canadian Government was retaining the treasures, brought here early in the war for safe-keeping.

He said flatly that the Government did not know where the treasures were hidden but was doing what it could, within its legal questions of international law, the Polish Government would have to name someone responsible for removing the treasures from the country.

"DEATH VALLEY" HAS UNUSUAL ROMANTIC STORY ANGLE

Photographed in Death Valley this thrilling story of man's lust for gold at the Capitol Theatre presents a very interesting and unusual love story.

Here we find a beautiful girl, Helen Gilbert, prospecting for gold with her uncle Russell Simpson. He breaks his leg and lies helpless until Nat Pendleton arrives on the scene.

He offers to hold it for her, using his love for the girl for his selfish aims. He gets drunk and the money is stolen.

During the escapade in a music hall they are joined by a sailor, Robert Lowery. Pendleton recovers the money but says he did not. Lowery returns to the camp with them.

It was learned from other sources that there is probably only one person who knows definitely where all the missing treasures are located. He is a Pole, whose name was not disclosed, but who is believed to be living in Canada.

He is understood to be one of two custodians who originally brought the treasures to Canada in 1940 and who believes he has a sacred trust to keep these national treasures secretly hidden from the National Museum in Krakow.

This Pole continues to support the former London Polish Government-in-exile, whose members remain bitterly at odds with the present recognized Warsaw regime.

The External Affairs Department spokesman pointed out that the Warsaw Government, through its Legation here, could take legal action to get the treasures back.

While the Polish Legation would make no comment, there are indications this course of action is under consideration by the Poles.

It was learned from Polish sources that Dr. Z.R. Blizski, charge d'affaires of the Polish Legation, had an interview at noon with External Affairs Minister St. Laurent and the question of the treasures may have been discussed.

In the event of court action, which would be a very complicated procedure and would involve some

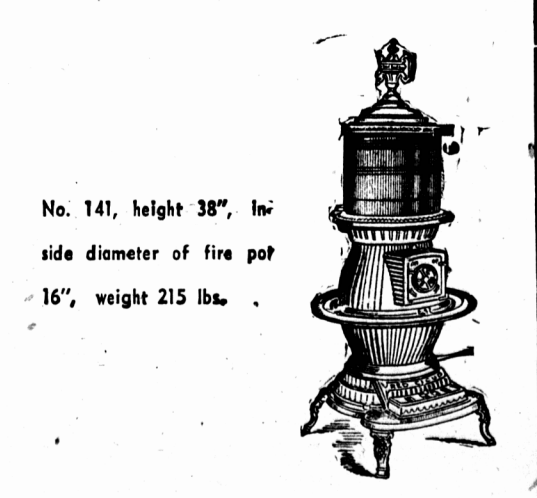
